SU	JMMARY OF ITEM				
The building on the subject property was previously occupied by a bar, which was a nonconforming but grandfathered use in the current IH zoning. However, it has now been vacant longer than six months and, therefore, is no longer grandfathered for that use. The new owner desires to have a hair salon in the building, and a portable food establishment (trailer) outside. Such uses outside of the CCB district require a commercial zoning classification of either CMB or CHB. The requested CMB classification does not allow bars, so it would eliminate any chance of the use of the property resuming as a bar. The proposed change from IH to CMB represents a decrease in potential intensity. Considering that the closest land uses other than the City Park are commercial and industrial, and those uses will continue to have the IH industrial zoning classification, the requested zoning change should have no affect on the surrounding area. Because the existing building is small and is not designed for an industrial use, the CMB zoning classification would simply allow potential uses to be in compliance with the zoning of the property. The requested CMB zoning classification is not consistent with the Lockhart 2020 Future Land Use Plan map, which designates the subject tract as Medium Density Residential. However, considering that the immediate area is dominated by Livengood's Feeds and Lockhart Gin, which are both industrial uses, it is unlikely that the area will be suitable for residential uses of any type in the foreseeable future. No opposition to the zoning change has been expressed. More information is available in the attached staff report.

ORDINANCE 2017-07

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LOCKHART, TEXAS, AMENDING THE OFFICIAL ZONING MAP OF THE CITY OF LOCKHART, TEXAS, TO RECLASSIFY THE PROPERTY KNOWN AS 0.374 ACRE IN THE BYRD LOCKHART SURVEY, ABSTRACT NO. 17, LOCATED AT 308 NORTH COLORADO STREET (US 183), FROM IH INDUSTRIAL HEAVY DISTRICT TO CMB COMMERCIAL MEDIUM BUSINESS DISTRICT.

WHEREAS, on March 22, 2017, the Planning and Zoning Commission held a public hearing and voted unanimously to recommend approval of said change; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to amend the zoning map as provided in Section 64-128 of the Code of Ordinances; and,

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held in conformance with applicable law;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOCKHART, TEXAS, THAT:

I. The above-referenced property described in Zoning Change request ZC-17-04 as 0.374 acre in the Byrd Lockhart Survey, Abstract No. 17, more particularly described in Exhibit A and located at 308 North Colorado Street (US 183), will be reclassified from IH Industrial Heavy District to CMB Commercial Medium Business District.

II. Severability: If any provision, section, clause, sentence, or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, void, invalid, or unenforced, the validity of the remainder of this ordinance or its application shall not be affected, it being the intent of the City Council in adopting and of the Mayor in approving this ordinance that no portion, provision, or regulation contained herein shall become inoperative or fail by way of reasons of any unconstitutionality or invalidity of any other portion, provision or regulation.

III. Repealer: That all other ordinances, sections, or parts of ordinances heretofore adopted by the City of Lockhart in conflict with the provisions set out above in this ordinance are hereby repealed or amended as indicated.

IV. Publication: That the City Secretary is directed to cause this ordinance caption to be published in a newspaper of general circulation according to law.

V. Effective Date: That this ordinance shall become effective and be in full force immediately upon and from the date of its passage.

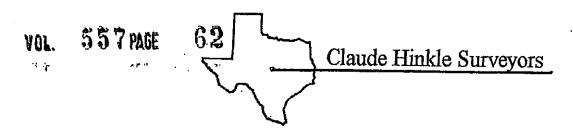

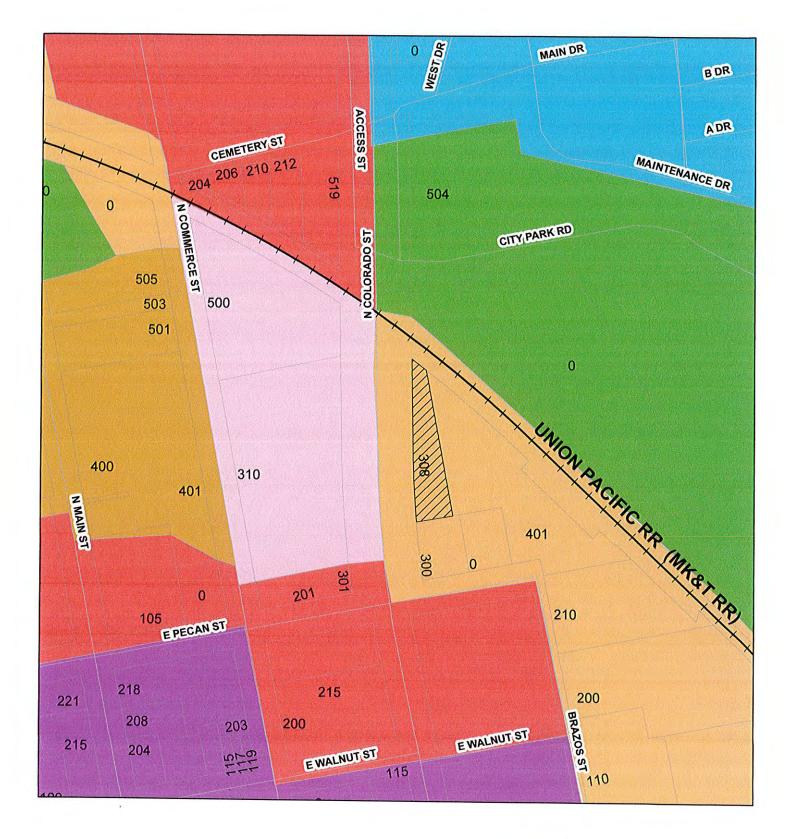

ANALYSIS OF ISSUES

REASON FOR REQUESTED CHANGE: The building on the subject property was previously occupied by a bar, which was a nonconforming but grandfathered use in the current IH (industrial Heavy) zoning. However, it has now been vacant longer than six months and, therefore, is no longer grandfathered for that use. The applicant desires to have a hair salon in the building, and a portable food establishment (trailer) outside. Such uses outside of the CCB (Commercial Central Business) district require a commercial zoning classification of either CMB (Commercial Medium Business) or CHB (Commercial Heavy Business). The requested CMB classification does not allow bars, so it would eliminate any chance of the use of the property resuming as a bar. In addition, the small size of the property is not conducive to many of the more intense uses that are allowed in the CHB district.

TRANSITION OF ZONING DISTRICTS: There is no other commercial zoning district adjacent to the subject property, but there is CHB zoning to the southwest on the other side of the Colorado Street overpass, which is also where the nearest residential zoning is located. The subject property will remain bounded by the current IH zoning classification on the east and south sides, which is an acceptable transition.

ADEQUACY OF INFRASTRUCTURE: Vehicular access is along a driveway from Pecan Street within the Colorado Street (US 183) right-of-way. The parking area in front of the building is actually in the right-of-way, as well, with the property line being adjacent to the front of the building. The parking lot on the north side is entirely within the private property. All necessary utilities are already available to the site.

POTENTIAL NEIGHBORHOOD IMPACT: The proposed change from IH to CMB represents a decrease in potential intensity. Considering that the closest land uses other than the City Park are commercial and industrial, and those uses will continue to have the IH industrial zoning classification, the requested zoning change should have no negative affect on the surrounding area. Because the existing building is small and is not designed for an industrial use, the CMB zoning classification would simply allow potential uses to be in compliance with the zoning of the property.

CONSISTENCY WITH COMPREHENSIVE PLAN: The requested CMB zoning classification is not consistent with the Lockhart 2020 Future Land Use Plan map, which designates the subject tract as Medium Density Residential. However, considering that the immediate area is dominated by Livengood's Feeds and Lockhart Gin which are both industrial uses, it is unlikely that the area will be suitable for residential uses of any type in the foreseeable future, especially adjacent to the highway overpass where the subject property is located.

ALTERNATIVE CLASSIFICATIONS: None more appropriate.

RESPONSE TO NOTIFICATION: Public hearing notices were mailed to the five owners of property (other than the City) within 200 feet, and no comments have been received as of the date of this report.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOCKHART, TEXAS, AMENDING CHAPTER 31 "IMPACT FEES" OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, INCORPORATING UPDATED LAND USE ASSUMPTIONS AND UPDATED WATER, WASTEWATER, AND ROADWAY CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PLANS AS EXHIBITS; AMENDING THE FEES FOR WATER, WASTEWATER, AND ROAD IMPACT FEES AS SET FORTH IN APPENDIX I; AMENDING AFFECTED SECTIONS REFERENCING THE UPDATED APPENDICIES AND EXHIBITS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING A REPEALER; AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, on January 15, 2002, the City Council adopted Ordinance 02-02 establishing a new Chapter 31 in the Lockhart Code of Ordinances providing for the establishment of water, wastewater, and road impact fees; and,

WHEREAS, Section 395.052 of the Texas Local Government Code requires that a political subdivision imposing impact fees shall update the land use assumptions and capital improvements plans at least every five years unless the city council determines that an update is not necessary; and,

WHEREAS, on March 20, 2007, the City Council adopted Ordinance 07-11 amending Chapter 31 by incorporating updated land use assumptions and updated water, wastewater, and roadway capital improvements plans as exhibits; amending the fees for water, wastewater. an roadway impact fees as set forth in Appendix I; and amending other sections referencing the updated appendices and exhibits; and,

WHEREAS, on April 5, 2011, upon the recommendation of the Impact Fee Advisory Committee, the City Council determined that a five-year update was not necessary due to only a modest increase in population, and very little change in project priorities and construction costs, since the previous update; and,

WHEREAS, on April 19, 2016, upon the recommendation of the Impact Fee Advisory Committee, the City Council determined that an update was necessary at the next five-year anniversary due to significant changes in project priorities and construction costs, and directed staff to employ consultants to assist with the necessary updates for adoption in 2017; and,

WHEREAS, the consulting firm of Freese and Nichols, Inc. was retained to assist in the update of the land use assumptions and roadway impact fee capital improvements plan and fees, and the consulting firm of TRC Engineers, Inc. was retained to assist in the update of the water and wastewater capital improvements plans and fees; and,

WHEREAS, the Impact Fee Advisory Committee has reviewed and recommended the results of the update studies, as reflected in their letter to the Council dated March 23, 2017;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOCKHART, TEXAS, THAT:

I. Chapter 31 "Impact Fees", is hereby amended as follows, wherein all existing articles, sections, subsections, paragraphs and other provisions, or portions thereof, not listed shall remain unchanged:

ARTICLE II. WATER FACILITIES IMPACT FEES

Section 31-23. Water service area.

(a) There is hereby established a water service area, constituting land within the city limits and within the city's extraterritorial jurisdiction, as depicted on Figure 2 in Exhibit 1 attached to the ordinance from which this chapter derives and incorporated by reference herein.

Section 31-24. Water improvements plan.

(a) The water improvements plan for the city is hereby adopted as Exhibit 2 attached to the ordinance from which this chapter derives and incorporated by reference herein.

ARTICLE III. WASTEWATER FACILITIES IMPACT FEES

Section 31-26. Wastewater service area.

(a) There is hereby established a wastewater service area, constituting land within the city limits and within the city's extraterritorial jurisdiction, as depicted on Figure 2 in Exhibit 1 attached to the ordinance from which this chapter derives and incorporated by reference herein.

Section 31-27. Wastewater improvements plan.

(a) The wastewater improvements plan for the city is hereby adopted as Exhibit 2 attached to the ordinance from which this chapter derives and incorporated by reference herein.

ARTICLE IV. ROADWAY IMPACT FEES

Section 31-29. Roadway service area.

(a) There is hereby established a roadway service area, constituting land within the city limits, as depicted on Figure 1 in Exhibit 1 attached to the ordinance from which this chapter derives and incorporated by reference herein.

Section 31-30. Roadway improvements plan.

(a) The roadway improvements plan for the city is hereby adopted as Exhibit 3 attached to the ordinance from which this chapter derives and incorporated by reference herein.

III. <u>Repealer</u>: That all other ordinances, section, or parts of ordinances heretofore adopted by the City of Lockhart in conflict with the provisions set out above in this ordinance are hereby repealed or amended as indicated.

IV. <u>Publication</u>: That the City Secretary is directed to cause this ordinance caption to be published in a newspaper of general circulation according to law.

V. <u>Effective Date</u>: That this ordinance shall become effective and in full force immediately upon its passage.

IMPACT FEE UPDATE RECOMMENDATION

On April 19, 2016, the Impact Fee Advisory Committee submitted their semi-annual report to the Council regarding the status of the impact fee accounts and implementation of the water, wastewater, and road impact fees capital improvements plans. The report recommended, in accordance with State law requiring that impact fee ordinances be updated on a five-year cycle, that the Council hire consultants for the purpose of updating our land use assumptions, capital improvements plans, and impact fees for water, wastewater, and roadway facilities. The Council accepted the Committee's report and its recommendations, and subsequently the consulting firm of Freese and Nichols, Inc. was retained to assist in the update of the land use assumptions and roadway impact fee capital improvements plan and fees, and the consulting firm of TRC Engineers, Inc. was retained to assist in the update of the state state.

During the period from November 2016 through February 2017, the Impact Fee Advisory Committee met four times with staff and the consultants to review and discuss the data collected and documents prepared for the update. UPON CAREFUL CONSIDERATION, THE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS ADOPTION OF AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 31, LOCKHART CODE OF ORDINANCES, TO UPDATE THE FOLLOWING:

- 1. Impact Fee Land Use Assumptions, and Capital Improvement Plans for Water, Wastewater, and Roadway projects, which are referenced in Ordinance 2017-08 as Exhibits 1, 2, and 3.
- 2. Water Impact Fees, increasing the cost per service unit from \$1,223.96 to \$1,700.07. This is 50 percent of the maximum allowable fee.
- 3. Wastewater Impact Fees, increasing the cost per service unit from \$1,094.33 to \$1,345.87. This is 50 percent of the maximum allowable fee.
- 4. Roadway Impact Fees, increasing the cost per service unit from \$700 in the current single service area to \$1,304.00 in both of the new service areas. This is 50 percent of the maximum allowable fee in Service Area #1, and 45 percent of the maximum allowable fee in Service Area #2.

The Impact Fee Advisory Committee agreed that the impact fee increases described above are necessary to assist in the funding for critical water, wastewater, and roadway projects needed to accommodate future growth, while maintaining the character and quality of life envisioned by city residents in the Lockhart 2020 Comprehensive Plan. The recommended collection rates also rank favorably within the ranges charged by other communities.

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Appendix I

ARTICLE I. GENERAL PROVISIONS

Sec. 31-1. Short title.

This chapter shall be known and cited as the Lockhart Impact Fee Regulations. (Ord. No. 02-02, § 1, 1-15-02)

Sec. 31-2. Purpose.

This chapter is intended to assure the provision of adequate public facilities to serve new development in the city by requiring each development to pay its share of the costs of such improvements necessitated by and attributable to such new development. (Ord. No. 02-02, § 1, 1-15-02)

Sec. 31-3. Authority.

This chapter is adopted pursuant to V.T.C.A., Local Government Code ch. 395 and the city Charter. The provisions of this chapter shall not be construed to limit the power of the city to utilize other methods authorized under state law or pursuant to other city powers to accomplish the purposes set forth herein, either in substitution or in conjunction with this chapter. Guidelines may be developed by ordinance, resolution, or otherwise to implement and administer this chapter.

(Ord. No. 02-02, § 1, 1-15-02)

Sec. 31-4. Definitions.

Assessment means the determination of the amount of the maximum impact fee per service unit which can be imposed on new development pursuant to this chapter.

Capital improvement means either a water facility, a wastewater facility, or a roadway facility with a life expectancy of three or more years, to be owned and operated by or on behalf of the city.

Capital improvement advisory committee, also known as the Impact fee advisory committee, means the city's planning and zoning commission, together with such ad hoc representatives as may be appointed from time to time, to fulfill the composition mandated by V.T.C.A., Local Government Code § 395.058.

City means the City of Lockhart, Texas.

Credit means the amount of the reduction of an impact fee for fees, payments or charges for the same type of capital improvements for which the fee has been assessed.

Facilities expansion means either a water facility expansion, a wastewater facility expansion, or a roadway facility expansion.

Final plat approval or approval of a final plat means the point at which the applicant has complied with all conditions of approval and the plat has been released for filing with the county.

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Impact fee means either a fee for water facilities, a fee for wastewater facilities or a fee for roadway imposed on new development by the city pursuant to this chapter in order to generate revenue to fund or recoup all or part of the costs of capital improvements or facility expansion necessitated by and attributable to such new development. Impact fees do not include the dedication of rights-of-way or easements for such facilities, or the construction of such improvements, imposed pursuant to the city's zoning or subdivision regulations, nor do impact fees include fees placed in trust funds for the purpose of reimbursing developers for oversizing or constructing water or wastewater mains, or pro rata fees for reimbursement of the city's costs for extending water or wastewater mains. Impact fees also do not include charges for water or wastewater services to a wholesale customer such as a water district, political subdivision of the state, or other wholesale utility customer.

Impact fee capital improvements plan means either a water improvements plan, a wastewater improvements plan or a roadway capital improvements plan adopted or revised pursuant to these impact fee regulations.

Land use assumptions means the projections of population and employment growth and associated changes in land uses, densities and intensities adopted by the city, as may be amended from time to time, upon which the impact fee capital improvements plans are based.

Land use equivalency table means a table converting the demands for roadway capital improvements generated by various land uses to numbers of service units, as may be amended from time to time, which table is named "Table 2" in appendix I and is located at the end of this chapter.

Living unit equivalency table means a table converting the demands for water and wastewater capital improvements generated by various water meter sizes to numbers of service units as may be amended from time to time, which table is named "Table 1" in appendix I and is located at the end of this chapter.

New development means a project involving the construction, reconstruction, redevelopment, conversion, structural alteration, relocation, or enlargement of any structure, or any use or extension of land, which has the effect of increasing the requirements for capital improvements or facility expansions, measured by the number of service units to be generated by such activity, and which requires either the approval and filing with the county of a plat pursuant to the city's subdivision regulations, the issuance of a building permit, or connection to the city's water or wastewater system, and which has not been exempted from these regulations by provisions herein.

Offset means the amount of the reduction of an impact fee designed to fairly reflect the value of system facilities pursuant to rules herein established or council-approved administrative guidelines, provided by a developer pursuant to the city's subdivision regulations or requirements.

Plat has the meaning given the term in the city's subdivision regulations. "Plat" includes replat.

IMPACT FEES

Property owner means any person, corporation, legal entity or agent thereof having a legal or equitable interest in the land for which an impact fee becomes due. "Property owner" includes the developer for the new development.

Recoupment means the imposition of an impact fee to reimburse the city for capital improvements which the city has previously oversized to serve new development.

Roadway means any freeway, expressway, principal or minor arterial or collector roadways designated in the city's adopted thoroughfare plan, as may be amended from time to time. Roadway also includes any roadway designated as a numbered highway on the official federal or state highway system, to the extent that the city incurs capital improvement costs for such facility.

Roadway facility means an improvement or appurtenance to a roadway which includes, but is not limited to, rights-of-way, whether conveyed by deed or easement; intersection improvements; traffic signals; turn lanes; drainage facilities associated with the roadway; street lighting or curbs. "Roadway facility" also includes any improvement or appurtenance to an intersection with a roadway officially enumerated in the federal or state highway system, and to any improvements or appurtenances to such federal or state highway, to the extent that the city has incurred capital costs for such facilities, including without limitation local matching funds and costs related to utility line relocation and the establishment of curbs, gutters, sidewalks, drainage appurtenances and rights-of-way. "Roadway facility" excludes those improvements or appurtenances to any roadway which is a site-related facility.

Roadway facility expansion means the expansion of the capacity of an existing roadway in the city, but does not include the repair, maintenance, modernization, or expansion of an existing roadway to better serve existing development.

Roadway improvements plan means the adopted plan, as may be amended from time to time, which identifies the roadway facilities or roadway expansions and their costs for each road service area, which are necessitated by and which are attributable to new development, for a period not to exceed ten years, which are to be financed in whole or in part through the imposition of road facilities fees pursuant to this chapter.

Service area means either a water service area, a wastewater service area or a roadway service area within the city or (except for roadway services areas) within the city's extraterritorial jurisdiction, within which impact fees for capital improvements or facility expansion may be collected for new development occurring within such area and within which fees so collected will be expended for those types of improvements or expansions identified in the type of capital improvements plan applicable to the service area.

Service unit means, for water or wastewater facilities, a living unit equivalent based upon a five-eighths-inch by three-quarter-inch displacement type water meter, which serves as the standardized measure of consumption, use or generation attributable to the new unit of development; for roadway facilities, service unit means a vehicle mile.

LOCKHART CODE

Site-related facility means an improvement or facility which is for the primary use or benefit of a new development and/or which is for the primary purpose of safe and adequate provision of water or wastewater facilities to serve the new development, and which is not included in the impact fees capital improvements plan and for which the developer or property owner is solely responsible under subdivision or other applicable regulations.

System facility means a capital improvement or facility expansion which is designated in the impact fee capital improvements plan and which is not a site-related facility. System facility may include a capital improvement which is located offsite, or within or on the perimeter of the development site.

Water facility means a water transmission line or main, pump station, storage tank, water supply facility, treatment facility or other facility included within and comprising an integral component of the city's water storage or distribution system. Water facility includes land, easements or structures associated with such facilities. Water facility excludes site-related facilities.

Water facility expansion means the expansion of the capacity of any existing water facility for the purpose of serving new development, but does not include the repair, maintenance, modernization, or expansion of an existing water improvement to serve existing development.

Water improvements plan means the adopted plan, as may be amended from time to time, which identifies the water facilities or water expansions and their associated costs which are necessitated by and which are attributable to new development, for a period not to exceed ten years, and which are to be financed in whole or in part through the imposition of water facilities impact fees pursuant to this chapter.

Water meter means a device for measuring the flow of water to a development, whether for domestic or for irrigation purposes.

Wastewater facility means a wastewater interceptor or main, lift station, treatment facility or other facility included within and comprising an integral component of the city's collection and transmission system for wastewater. Wastewater facility includes land, easements or structures associated with such facilities. Wastewater facility excludes a site-related facility.

Wastewater facility expansion means the expansion of the capacity of any existing wastewater improvement for the purpose of serving new development, but does not include the repair, maintenance, modernization, or expansion of an existing sewer facility to serve existing development.

Wastewater improvements plan means the adopted plan, as may be amended from time to time, which identifies the wastewater facilities or wastewater expansions and their associated costs which are necessitated by and which are attributable to new development, for a period not to exceed ten years, and which are to be financed in whole or in part through the imposition of wastewater facilities fees pursuant to this chapter.

Sec. 31-4.5. Appendices and attachments.

Sec. 31-5. Applicability.

The provisions of this chapter concerning water and wastewater impact fees apply to all new, non-exempt development within the corporate boundaries of the city and within its

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extraterritorial jurisdiction. The provisions of this chapter concerning roadway impact fees apply to all new, non-exempt development within the corporate boundaries of the city. The provisions of this chapter apply uniformly within each service area. (Ord. No. 02-02, § 1, 1-15-02)

Sec. 31-6. Impact fee as condition of development approval.

No application for new development shall be approved within the city without assessment of an impact fee pursuant to this chapter, and no building permit shall be issued unless the applicant has paid the impact fee imposed by and calculated hereinunder, unless a different time and/or method of payment has been authorized by agreement between the city and the property owner.

(Ord. No. 02-02, § 1, 1-15-02)

Sec. 31-7. Impact fees per service unit.

(a) Maximum impact fees per service unit for each service area shall be established by category of capital improvements. The maximum impact fee per service unit for each service area for each category of capital improvement shall be computed in the following manner:

- (1) Calculate the total projected costs of capital improvements necessitated by and attributable to new development in the service area identified in the impact fee capital improvements plan for each category of capital improvements;
- (2) From such amount, subtract a credit equal to 50 percent of the such total projected costs; and
- (3) Divide the resultant amount by the total number of service units anticipated within the service area, based upon the land use assumptions for that service area.

(b) As an alternative to the 50 percent credit referenced in subsection (a)(2), the city may incorporate within the capital improvements plan for any category of capital improvements a discount against the total costs of capital improvements, in the amount of that portion of ad valorem tax and utility service revenues, if any, including the payment of debt, to be generated by new service units during the period the capital improvements plan is in effect, including the payment of debt, associated with the capital improvements in the plan.

(c) The impact fee per service unit which is to be paid by each new development within a service area shall be that established by ordinance by the city council, as such may be amended from time to time, and shall be an amount less than or equal to the maximum impact fee per service unit established in subsection (a).

(d) The amount of the impact fees to be assessed by water meter type and size or by vehicle mile shall be as set forth in schedule 1, located at the end of this chapter. The amount of the impact fees which are to be paid by water meter type and size or by vehicle mile shall be as set forth in schedule 2, located at the end of this chapter. Impact fee schedules 1 and 2 may be amended from time to time utilizing the amendment procedure set forth in section 31-16. (Ord. No. 02-02, § 1, 1-15-02)

Sec. 31-8. Assessment of impact fees.

- (a) Assessment of the impact fee for any new development shall be made as follows:
- (1) For land which is unplatted at the time of application for a building permit or utility connection, or for a new development which received final plat approval prior to the effective date of this chapter, and for which no replatting is necessary pursuant to the city's subdivision regulations prior to development, assessment of impact fees shall occur at the time application is made for the building permit or utility connection, whichever first occurs, and shall be the amount of the maximum impact fee per service unit as set forth in schedule 1 then in effect.
- (2) For a new development which is submitted for approval pursuant to the city's subdivision regulations on or after the effective date of the ordinance from which this section derives, or for which replatting results in an increase in the number of service units after such date, assessment of impact fees shall be at the time of final plat approval, and shall be the amount of the maximum impact fee per service unit as set forth in schedule 1 then in effect.

(b) Following assessment of the impact fee pursuant to subsection (a), the amount of the impact fee assessment per service unit for that development cannot be increased, unless the owner proposes to change the approved development by the submission of a new application for final plat approval or other development application that results in approval of additional service units, in which case a new assessment shall occur at the schedule 1 rate then in effect for such additional service units.

(c) Following the vacating of any plat or submittal of any replat, a new assessment must be made in accordance with subsection 8(a)(2).

(d) Approval of an amended plat pursuant to Tex. Loc. Gov't Code, section 212.016 and the city's subdivision regulations is not subject to reassessment for an impact fee. (Ord. No. 02-02, § 1, 1-15-02)

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Sec. 31-9. Payment and collection of impact fees.

(a) Impact fees shall be collected at the time the city issues a building permit for land within the corporate limits, or at the time an application for an individual water meter connection to the city's water or wastewater system is filed, for land located outside the corporate limits of the city.

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(b) The impact fees to be paid and collected by water meter size or by vehicle mile shall be the amount listed in schedule 2. The city may enter into an agreement with a developer for a different time and manner of payment of impact fees, in which case the agreement shall determine the time and manner of payment.

(c) The city shall compute the impact fees for the new development in the following manner:

- (1) The amount of each impact fee shall be determined by multiplying the number of service units generated by the new development by the impact fee per service unit for the service area using schedule 2. The number of service units shall be determined by using table 1 or table 2, as applicable.
- (2) The amount of each impact fee shall be reduced by any allowable offsets or credits for that category of capital improvements, in the manner provided in section 31-10.
- (3) The total amount of the impact fees for the new development shall be calculated and attached to the development application or request for connection as a condition of approval.

(d) The amount of each impact fee for a new development shall not exceed an amount computed by multiplying the fee assessed per service unit pursuant to section 31-8 by the number of service units generated by the development.

(e) If the building permit for which an impact fee has been paid has expired, and a new application is thereafter filed, the impact fees shall be computed using schedule 2 then in effect, with credits for previous payment of fees being applied against the new fees due.

(f) Whenever the property owner proposes to increase the number of service units for a development, the additional impact fees collected for such new service units shall be determined by using schedule 2 then in effect, and such additional fee shall be collected at the times prescribed by this section.

(g) Notwithstanding other provisions of this section 31-9, no impact fee may be collected for a new development which was platted prior to the effective date of these regulations and for which a building permit was issued prior to such effective date or within one year thereof; provided that a building permit that expires or is withdrawn for such development shall be subject to collection of impact fees in accordance with this section 31-9. (Ord. No. 02-02, § 1, 1-15-02; Ord. No. 07-11, § I, 3-20-07)

Sec. 31-10. Offsets and credits against impact fees.

(a) The city shall offset or credit the present value of any system facility, pursuant to rules established in this section or pursuant to administrative guidelines promulgated by the city, which has been dedicated or contributed to and received by the city, including the value of rights-of-ways or capital improvements constructed pursuant to an agreement with the city, against the amount of the impact fee due for that category of capital improvement. The offset or credit shall be associated with the plat of the property that is to be served by the capital improvement constructed.

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(b) All offsets or credits against impact fees shall be based upon standards promulgated by the city, which may be adopted as administrative guidelines, including the following standards:

- (1) No offset or credit shall be given for the dedication or construction of site-related facilities.
- (2) No offset shall exceed an amount equal to the eligible costs of the improvement multiplied by a fraction, the numerator of which is the impact fee per service unit due for the new development as computed using schedule 2 and the denominator of which is the maximum impact fee per service unit for the new development as computed using schedule 1.
- (3) The unit costs used to calculate offsets and credits shall not exceed those assumed for the capital improvements included in the impact fees capital improvements plan for the category of facility for which the impact fee is imposed.
- (4) No offset or credit shall be given for an oversized facility which is not identified within the applicable impact fees capital improvements plan, unless the city agrees that such improvement supplies capacity to new developments other than the development paying the impact fee and provisions for offsets or credits are incorporated in an agreement for capital improvements pursuant to section 31-18.
- (5) In no event will the city reimburse the property owner or developer for an offset or credit when no impact fees for the new development can be collected pursuant to these impact fee regulations or for any amount exceeding the total impact fees due for the development for that category of capital improvements, unless expressly agreed to by the city in writing.
- (6) Offsets or credits for system facilities dedicated to and accepted by the city for a development prior to the effective date of this chapter shall be prorated among the total number of service units within such development and reduced by an amount equivalent to the number of existing service units within such development and shall be further reduced by the amount of any participation funds received from the city and by any payments received from other developments who utilize the system facility.
- (7) The city may participate in the costs of a system improvement to be dedicated to the city, including costs that exceed the amount of the impact fees due for the development under schedule 1 for that category of capital improvements, in accordance with policies and rules established under the city's subdivision regulations. The amount of any offset shall not include the amount of the city's participation.

(c) Offsets or credits created after the effective date of this chapter shall expire within ten years from the date the offset or credit was created. Offsets or credits arising prior to such effective date shall expire ten years from such effective date.

(d) Unless an agreement for capital improvements is executed providing for a different manner of offsetting or crediting impact fees due, an offset or credit associated with a plat shall be applied to reduce an impact fee at the time of application for the first building permit or at

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the time of application for the first utility connection for the property, in the case of land located within the city's extraterritorial jurisdiction, and, thereafter, to reduce impact fees subsequently to be collected, until the offset or credit is exhausted. (Ord. No. 02-02, § 1, 1-15-02)

Sec. 31-11. Establishment of accounts.

(a) The city's finance department shall establish an account to which interest is allocated for each service area for each category of capital facility for which an impact fee is imposed pursuant to this chapter. Each impact fee collected within the service area shall be deposited in such account.

(b) Interest earned on the account into which the impact fees are deposited shall be considered funds of the account and shall be used solely for the purposes authorized in section 31-12.

(c) The city's finance department shall establish adequate financial and accounting controls to ensure that impact fees disbursed from the account are utilized solely for the purposes authorized in section 31-12. Disbursement of funds shall be authorized by the city at such times are reasonably necessary to carry out the purposes and intent of this chapter; provided, however, that any fee paid shall be expended within a reasonable period of time, but not to exceed ten years from the date the fee is deposited into the account.

(d) The city's finance department shall maintain and keep financial records for impact fees, which shall show the source and disbursement of all fees collected in or expended from each service area. The records of the account into which impact fees are deposited shall be open for public inspection and copying during ordinary business hours. The city may establish a fee for copying services.

(e) The finance department shall maintain and keep adequate financial records for said account which shall show the source and disbursement of all funds placed in or expended by such account.

(Ord. No. 02-02, § 1, 1-15-02)

Sec. 31-12. Use of proceeds of impact fee accounts.

(a) The impact fees collected for each service area pursuant to these regulations may be used to finance or to recoup the costs of any capital improvements or facility expansion identified in the applicable capital improvements plan for the service area, including but not limited to the construction contract price, surveying and engineering fees, land acquisition costs (including land purchases, court awards and costs, attorney's fees, and expert witness fees). Impact fees may also be used to pay the principal sum and interest and other finance costs on bonds, notes or other obligations issued by or on behalf of the city to finance such capital improvements or facility expansions. Impact fees also may be used to pay fees actually contracted to be paid to an independent qualified engineer or financial consultant for preparation of or updating the impact fee capital improvements plan.

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(b) Impact fees collected pursuant to this chapter shall not be used to pay for any of the following expenses:

- (1) Construction, acquisition or expansion of capital improvements or assets other than those identified in the applicable capital improvements plan;
- (2) Repair, operation, or maintenance of existing or new capital improvements or facility expansion;
- (3) Upgrade, expansion or replacement of existing capital improvements to serve existing development in order to meet stricter safety, efficiency, environmental or regulatory standards;
- (4) Upgrade, expansion, or replacement of existing capital improvements to provide better service to existing development; provided, however, that impact fees may be used to pay the costs of upgrading, expanding or replacing existing capital improvements in order to meet the need for new capital improvements generated by new development; or

(5) Administrative and operating costs of the city. (Ord. No. 02-02, § 1, 1-15-02)

Sec. 31-13. Appeals.

(a) The property owner or applicant for new development may appeal the following administrative decisions to the city council:

- (1) The applicability of an impact fee to the development;
- (2) The amount of the impact fee due;
- (3) The availability of, the amount of, or the expiration of an offset or credit;
- (4) The application of an offset or credit against an impact fee due;
- (5) The amount of the impact fee in proportion to the benefit received by the new development; or
- (6) The amount of a refund due, if any.

(b) The burden of proof shall be on the appellant to demonstrate that the amount of the fee or the amount of the offset or credit was not calculated according to the applicable schedule of impact fees or the guidelines established for determining offsets or credits.

(c) The appellant must file a written notice of appeal with the city within 30 days following the decision. If the notice of appeal is accompanied by a payment or other security satisfactory to the city attorney in an amount equal to the original determination of the impact fee due, the development application may be processed while the appeal is pending. (Ord. No. 02-02, § 1, 1-15-02)

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Sec. 31-14. Refunds.

(a) Upon application, any impact fee or portion thereof collected pursuant to these regulations, which has not been expended within the service area within ten years from the date of payment, shall be refunded to the record owner of the property for which the impact fee was paid or, if the impact fee was paid by another governmental entity, to such governmental entity, together with interest calculated from the date of collection to the date of refund at the statutory rate as set forth in chapter 1.03, title 79, Revised Statutes (chapter 5069-1.03, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes), or its successor statute. The application for refund pursuant to this section shall be submitted within 60 days after the expiration of the ten-year period for expenditure of the fee. An impact fee shall be considered expended on a first-in, first out basis.

(b) An impact fee collected pursuant to these regulations shall also be considered expended if the total expenditures for capital improvements or facility expansion authorized in section 31-12 within the service area within ten years following the date of payment exceeds the total fees collected within the service area for such improvements or expansions during such period.

(c) Upon application, any impact fee or portion thereof collected pursuant to these regulations shall be refunded if:

- (1) Existing service is available and service is denied;
- (2) Service was not available when the fee was collected and the city has failed to commence construction of facilities to provide service within two years of fee payment; or
- (3) Service was not available when the fee was collected and has not subsequently been made available within a reasonable period of time considering the type of capital improvement or facility expansion to be constructed, but in any event later than five years from the date of fee payment.

(d) If a refund is due pursuant to subsections (a), (b) or (c), the city shall divide the difference between the amount of expenditures and the amount of the fees collected by the total number of service units assumed within the service area for the period to determine the refund due per service unit. The refund to the record owner shall be calculated by multiplying the refund due per service unit by the number of service units for the development for which the fee was paid, and interest due shall be calculated upon that amount. (Ord. No. 02-02, 1, 1-15-02)

Sec. 31-15. Rebates.

(a) If a tract of land for which an impact fee has been paid is replatted, resulting in a reduction in the number of service units, and the new impact fee to be collected is less than that paid, the city shall rebate the difference, provided that water meters to serve the development have not been installed.

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(b) If the building permit for a new development for which an impact fee has been paid has expired, no tap purchases for that category of capital improvements have been made to the development, and a modified or new application has not been filed within six months of such expiration, the city shall, upon written application, rebate the amount of the impact fee to the record owner of the property for which the impact fee was paid. If no application for rebate pursuant to this subsection has been filed within this period, no rebate shall become due. (Ord. No. 02-02, § 1, 1-15-02)

Sec. 31-16. Updates to plans and revision of fees.

(a) The city shall update its land use assumptions and capital improvements plans at least every five years, commencing from the date of adoption of such plans, and shall recalculate the impact fees based thereon in accordance with the procedures set forth in V.T.C.A., Local Government Code ch. 395, or in any successor statute.

(b) The city may review its land use assumptions, impact fees, capital improvements plans and other factors such as market conditions more frequently than provided in subsection (a) to determine whether the land use assumptions and capital improvements plans should be updated and the impact fee recalculated accordingly, or whether schedules 1 or 2 should be changed. Schedule 2 may be amended without revising land use assumptions and capital improvements plans at any time prior to the update provided for in subsection (a), provided that the impact fees to be collected under schedule 2 do not exceed the impact fees assessed under schedule 1.

(c) If, at the time an update is required pursuant to subsection (a), the city council determines that no change to the land use assumptions, capital improvements plan or impact fee is needed, it may dispense with such update by following the procedures in V.T.C.A., Local Government Code § 395.0575.

(d) The city may amend by resolution table 1 or table 2 at any time prior to the update provided for in subsection (a), provided that the number of service units associated with a particular use shall not be increased.

Sec. 31-17. Functions of capital improvements advisory committee.

- (a) The capital improvements advisory committee shall perform the following functions:
- (1) Advise and assist the city in adopting land use assumptions;
- (2) Review the capital improvements plans and file written comments on impact fees;
- (3) Monitor and evaluate implementation of the capital improvements plans;
- (4) Advise the city of the need to update or revise the land use assumptions, capital improvements plans and impact fees; and

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(5) File a semiannual report evaluating the progress of the capital improvements plans and identifying perceived inequities in implementing the plans or administering the impact fees.

(b) The city shall make available to the capital improvements advisory committee any professional reports prepared in the development or implementation of the capital improvements plans.

(c) The city council shall adopt procedural rules for the capital improvements advisory committee to follow in carrying out its duties. (Ord. No. 02-02, § 1, 1-15-02)

Sec. 31-18. Agreement for capital improvements.

(a) An owner of a new development may construct or finance a capital improvement or facility expansion designated in the impact fee capital improvements plan, if required or authorized by the city, by entering into an agreement with the city prior to the issuance of any building permit for the development. The agreement shall identify the estimated cost of the improvement or expansion, the schedule for initiation and completion of the improvement or expansion, a requirement that the improvement be designed and completed to city standards and such other terms and conditions as deemed necessary by the city. The agreement shall provide for the method to be used to determine the amount of the offset or credit to be given against impact fees due for the development.

(b) The city and such owner either may agree that the costs incurred or funds advanced will be offset or credited against the impact fees otherwise due from the new development, or they may agree that the city shall reimburse the owner for such costs from impact fees paid from other new developments which will use such capital improvements or facility expansions, or from other funding sources. In the event that the city elects to reimburse an owner for the dedication, construction or financing of a capital improvement or facility expansion designated in the capital improvements plan, the terms of reimbursement shall be incorporated in the agreement required by subsection (a). Reimbursement agreements shall further be based on the availability of city funds from all sources including current and projected impact fee fund accounts.

(Ord. No. 02-02, § 1, 1-15-02)

Sec. 31-19, Exceptions.

(a) To encourage affordable housing, 80 percent of all impact fees shall be waived or refunded based upon the prospective owner's total recurring household income, as set forth below:

(1) Where the city has applied for and received a state or federal housing infrastructure grant for the purpose of supporting low and moderate income housing, 80 percent of the impact fees shall be waived at the normal time of collection of such fees for lots in

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a subdivision that are developed and occupied in accordance with grant requirements. A certificate of occupancy shall not be issued for a dwelling until either of the following is submitted to the city:

- a. A written application and proof of the prospective homeowner's qualification for low and moderate income housing, as defined by the infrastructure grant program requirements; or
- b. Payment of the remaining 80 percent of all impact fees.
- (2) For lots or parcels that are not located in a subdivision receiving a state or federal housing infrastructure grant, the prospective owner of a new single-family dwelling may submit a written application and qualifying documentation of an annual income of 80 percent or less of the median household income for Caldwell County for the purpose of obtaining a reduction in impact fees in accordance with the following:
 - a. When the owner's household income is documented at the normal time of collection of impact fees, 80 percent of the impact fees shall be waived, resulting in a payment of 20 percent of the total amount.
 - b. When the owner is not known at the normal time of collection of impact fees, the full amount of all impact fees shall be paid. If the owner's household is later determined to meet the eligibility requirements, 80 percent of the amount of impact fees already paid shall be refunded directly to the homeowner, regardless of who originally paid the fees. If there is a mortgage closing, the refund shall be paid at any time before the closing date. If there is no mortgage closing, the refund shall be paid after issuance of a certificate of occupancy for the new dwelling.
- (b) Reserved.

(c) No water or wastewater impact fee shall be charged for a water meter on a line used exclusively for emergency fire suppression.

(d) No wastewater impact fee shall be charged for a water meter on a line used exclusively for landscape irrigation.

(e) To encourage infill development of vacant parcels in the older residential subdivisions, no impact fees shall be charged for construction of new single-family or duplex dwellings on property in the original Town of Lockhart as recorded in 1875 in Volume Q, Page 507, Caldwell County Deed Records, or on lots in subsequent named subdivisions recorded prior to January 1, 1970, that have frontage on an adequate paved street, and that have existing direct access to water and wastewater utilities without requiring off-site extensions or improvements. Sec. 31-20. Use of other financing mechanisms.

(a) The city may finance capital improvements or facility expansions designated in the capital improvements plan through the issuance of bonds, through the formation of public utility districts or other assessment districts, or through any other authorized mechanism, in such manner and subject to such limitations as may be provided by law, in addition to the use of impact fees.

(b) Except as herein otherwise provided, the assessment and collection of an impact fee shall be additional and supplemental to, and not in substitution of, any other tax, fee, charge or assessment which is lawfully imposed on and due against the property.

(c) The city council may decide that the city shall pay all or a part of impact fees due for a new development pursuant to duly adopted criteria. (Ord. No. 02-02, § 1, 1-15-02)

Sec. 31-21. Impact fee as additional and supplemental regulation.

(a) Impact fees established by these regulations are additional and supplemental to, and not in substitution of, any other requirements imposed by the city on the development of land or the issuance of building permits, the sale of water or wastewater taps, or certificates of occupancy. Such fee is intended to be consistent with and to further the policies of city's comprehensive land use plan, the capital improvements plan, the zoning ordinance, subdivision regulations and other city policies, ordinances and resolutions by which the city seeks to ensure the provision of adequate public facilities in conjunction with the development of land.

(b) This chapter shall not affect, in any manner, the permissible use of property, density of development, design, and improvement standards and requirements, or any other aspect of the development of land or provision of public improvements subject to the zoning and subdivision regulations or other regulations of the city, which shall be operative and remain in full force and effect without limitation with respect to all such development. (Ord. No. 02-02, § 1, 1-15-02)

Sec. 31-22. Relief procedures.

(a) Any person who has paid an impact fee or an owner of land upon which an impact fee has been paid may petition the city council to determine whether any duty required by this chapter has not been performed within the time so prescribed. The petition shall be in writing and shall state the nature of the unperformed duty and request that the duty be performed within 60 days of the request. If the city council determines that the duty is required pursuant to the ordinance and is late in being performed, it shall cause the duty to commence within 60 days of the date of the request and to continue until completion. This subsection is not applicable to matters which may be appealed pursuant to section 31-13.

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(b) The city council may grant a variance from any requirement of this chapter, upon written request by a developer or owner of property subject to the ordinance, following a public hearing, and only upon finding that a strict application of such requirement would, when regarded as a whole, result in confiscation of the property.

(c) If the city council grants a variance to the amount of the impact fee due for a new development under this section, it may cause to be appropriated from other city funds the amount of the reduction in the impact fee to the account for the service area in which the property is located.

Sec. 31-25. Water facilities impact fees.

(c) The impact fees per service unit for water facilities may be amended from time to time, pursuant to the procedures in section 31-16.

(a) The roadway improvements plan for the city is hereby adopted as exhibit 3 attached to the ordinance from which this chapter derives and incorporated by reference herein.

(b) The roadway improvements plan may be amended from time to time, pursuant to the procedures in section 31-16.

Sec. 31-31. Roadway facilities impact fees.

Work Session 6:30 p.m.

Mayor White opened the work session and advised the Council, staff and the audience that staff would provide information and explanations about the following items:

DISCUSSION ONLY

A. DISCUSS MINUTES OF THE CITY COUNCIL MEETING OF MARCH 7, 2017. Mayor White requested corrections to the minutes. There were none.

B. DISCUSS FIVE YEAR AGREEMENT WITH THE LOCKHART YOUTH SOCCER ASSOCIATION (LYSA) FOR USE OF THE CPL. JASON K. LAFLEUR SPORTS COMPLEX WHEREBY LYSA WOULD TAKE OVER CERTAIN MAINTENANCE AND OPERATIONAL **RESPONSIBILITIES IN EXCHANGE FOR DEFINED CONTROL OF THE FIELDS AND** CONCESSION STAND, AND APPOINTING THE CITY MANAGER TO SIGN THE AGREEMENT, IF APPROVED BY COUNCIL.

Mr. Rodgers stated that staff has been working with LYSA on a five year agreement whereby LYSA would take over certain maintenance and operational responsibilities of the Cpl. Jason K. LaFleur Sports Complex in exchange for defined control of the fields similar to the agreement the City has had with the Lockhart Little League Association for several years. LYSA would take over mowing and maintenance of the fields, cleaning and general maintenance of the concessions stand and restrooms, empty trash barrels, and perform litter pick up. The City Parks crew would still mow the areas outside the fields. LYSA would have the authority to rent out the fields under certain conditions to other non-profit organizations and groups and keep the revenues from such rentals. LYSA reviewed and approved the agreement before it was taken to the Parks Advisory Board which approved it with very minor suggested changes. Mr. Rodgers recommended approval. There was discussion.

Amy Limas of the LYSA provided information and there was discussion about their scheduled maintenance at the Sports Complex.

C. DISCUSS IMPLEMENTING THE NEW WEBSITE OF THE CITY OF LOCKHART, TEXAS AND AUTHORIZING STAFF TO PROCEED WITH ALL ASPECTS INVOLVED IN THE TRANSITION.

Ms. Constancio provided information and there was discussion regarding the new website.

D. DISCUSS ORDINANCE 2017-05 SUSPENDING UNTIL JUNE 16, 2017, THE PROPOSED GAS RELIABILITY INFRASTRUCTURE PROGRAM (GRIP) INTERIM RATE ADJUSTMENT OF THE TEXAS GAS SERVICE COMPANY, A DIVISION OF ONE GAS, FILED MARCH 3, 2017.

Mr. Rodgers stated that the ordinance delays until June 16, 2017 temporary gas rate increases referred to as Gas Reliability Infrastructure Program (GRIP) increases which are allowed by the Railroad Commission to recover gas system capital expenditures from the previous year. The increases, averaging \$1.33 per month for residents and \$5.79 for businesses, would begin on May 2, 2017 without passage of this ordinance. The requested increases appear to be valid because of the amount of funds that were spent on gas infrastructure improvements during the past year. Mr. Rodgers recommended approval. There was discussion.

E. DISCUSS ORDINANCE 2017-06 AMENDING PORTIONS OF CHAPTER 58, ARTICLE III, WATER, SEWER, ELECTRIC EXTENSIONS, DIVISION 1, GENERALLY, CHAPTER 58, SECTIONS 58-171 THROUGH 58-174 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES PROVIDING FOR A UTILITY MAIN EXTENSION APPLICATION AND A PRO-RATA REIMBURSEMENT APPLICATION AND PROCESS.

Mr. Rodgers stated that the ordinance makes minor changes to the existing utility extension policy and sets in place an application and process for possible pro-rata reimbursement of water, wastewater, and electric main line extensions initially paid for by an owner/developer. Currently the process for possible pro-rata reimbursement of expenses involved with main line extensions to the owner/developer is not clear. The City retains the right not to participate in such agreements. An example would be when the extensions would only benefit the owner/developer or City funds. Another example would be when a larger sewer main line extension is installed than is needed by the owner/developer demand only because a flatter grade can be used to achieve the distance to the owner/developer property. Mr. Rodgers recommended approval. There was discussion.

F. DISCUSS CHANGE ORDER #2 FOR QRO-MEX CONSTRUCTION COMPANY, INC., TO INCREASE THE CURRENT CONTRACT BY \$45,950 MAKING THE NEW CONTRACT AMOUNT \$2,154,615 FOR UTILITY WORK ON LOCUST STREET TO ACCOMMODATE DRAINAGE WORK TO BE PERFORMED ON PINE, COMAL, ASH STREETS, AND FOR OTHER INCREASED QUANTITIES IN THE CURRENT CONTRACT, AND APPOINTING THE MAYOR TO SIGN THE CHANGE ORDER, IF APPROVED.

Mr. Rodgers stated that Qro-Mex Construction Company, Inc., has the current contract to perform utility, drainage, and street improvements on the Richland Drive project and on the Mesquite-Braden-Vega-Wichita Street project; the unit prices for the work were very good. The contractor has agreed to extend the same unit prices for the proposed change order. The total current contract including Change Order #1 is \$2,108,665. The proposed Change Order #2 would add \$45,950 to the current contract to extend a deep wastewater line on Locust Street to accommodate the drainage project on Pine, Comal, and Ash Streets and allows for increased quantities in the approved contract. The new line will be very deep and is mostly in solid rock for which the contractor has special equipment. The percentage increase in the original contract, if approved, would be 23%; State law allows up to a 25% increase without re-bidding. The new contract amount, if Change Order #2 is approved, will be \$2,154,615. Mr. Rodgers recommended approval. There was discussion.

G. DISCUSSION REGARDING RESOLUTION 2017-06 RESCINDING RESOLUTION 2016-12 WHICH APPROVED THE 4B ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PROJECT BY HILL COUNTRY FOODWORKS, LLC AT 215 E. MLK, JR. INDUSTRIAL BLVD. IN ORDER TO ESTABLISH 4B PROJECTS WITH THE SAME COMPANY.

Mr. Tobias stated that the Lockhart Economic Development Corporation (LEDC) rescinded LEDC Resolution 2016-03 which is the previous 4B economic development project proposed by Hill Country Foodworks, LLC. in order to consider a new 4B project with a larger scope. This resolution rescinds the previous City Council Resolution 2016-02 for the original Hill Country Foodworks, LLC. project so that a new project can be considered for approval by the City Council. There was discussion.

H. DISCUSSION REGARDING RESOLUTION 2017-07 APPROVING A 4A TYPE PROJECT UNDER SECTION 4B OF THE TEXAS ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION ACT OF 1979, AS AMENDED, FOR FUNDING OF HILL COUNTRY FOODWORKS, LLC, IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$186,000 TO EMPLOY A MINIMUM OF 20 FULL TIME EQUIVALENT EMPLOYEES WITH AN AVERAGE ANNUAL WAGE OF \$30,250 AND AN ESTIMATED CAPITAL INVESTMENT OF \$1.475 MILLION OVER THE THREE-YEAR CONTRACTUAL PERIOD FOR LAND/BUILDING LOCATED AT 215 E. MLK, JR. INDUSTRIAL BLVD. IMPROVEMENTS AND PROFESSIONAL SERVICES.

Mr. Tobias stated that the Lockhart Economic Development Corporation (LEDC) unanimously voted to approve LEDC Resolution 2017-04 at its recent board meeting on March 13, 2017, after receiving input from Jacob Cathey one of the owners of Hill Country Foodworks, conducting a public hearing, receiving input from staff, and reviewing the Economic Development Impact Data sheet. Mr. Tobias provided brief information about the new scope of the project and recommended approval. There was discussion.

I. DISCUSSION REGARDING AN AMENDED CHAPTER 380 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT INCENTIVE AGREEMENT WITH HILL COUNTRY FOODWORKS, LLC WHICH REFLECTS A NEW SCOPE OF DEVELOPMENT INCLUDING A 5,000 SQUARE FOOT ADDITION TO THE BUILDING AT 215 E. MLK JR. INDUSTRIAL BLVD. WHICH SIGNIFICANTLY INCREASES THE PROJECT INVESTMENT FOR THE PROJECT FROM \$450,000 TO \$920,000 OVER THE THREE- YEAR AGREEMENT PERIOD WHICH INCLUDES A MINIMUM OF 20 JOBS MAKING A MINIMUM ANNUAL WAGE OF \$30,250. Mr. Tobias stated that Council approved a 380 Economic Development Incentive Agreement with Hill Country Foodworks, LLC. on October 13, 2016. The previous project resolution with Hill Country Foodworks has been rescinded. An amended 380 Agreement is needed to reflect the significant investment increase (from \$450,000 to \$920,000 not including the existing land and building) in the project by Hill Country Foodworks, LLC. The new agreement reflects possible higher property tax rebates because of the higher investment by the company as long as it maintains a minimum of 20 jobs at an average minimum annual wage of \$30,250 for three years. Mr. Tobias recommended approval.

There was discussion. Mr. Rodgers stated that he recommends offering tax rebates instead of tax abatements to enable businesses to show proof of abiding by and fulfilling the requirements as outlined in the incentive agreement.

J. DISCUSSION AFTER FISCAL YEAR 2016-2017 CITY COUNCIL GOALS UPDATE BY THE CITY MANAGER.

Mr. Rodgers stated that the goals provide a six-month update and invited comments or additional explanation about the goals. There was discussion.

Mr. Rodgers suggested that a goals workshop be held in April prior to beginning the budget workshop process.

Councilmember Castillo made a motion to approve Resolution 2017-06 rescinding Resolution 2016-12 which approved the 4B Economic Development project by Hill Country Foodworks, LLC. at 215 E. MLK, Jr. Industrial Blvd. in order to establish 4B projects with the same company. Councilmember Michelson seconded. The motion passed by a vote of 7-0.

ITEM 4-B. SUMMARY OF ITEM

The Texas Master Gardener Association, Inc. approached the Mayor and City Manager about the possibility of an agreement for use of the gardening area. The organization is a 501 (C) (3) entity. Members have been working the gardening space for more than a year. They would like to make several improvements at the site that involve a lot of sweat equity and some funds but they do not want to do this without some type of agreement to protect their investment. Much of the garden produce would be donated to the Food Bank. They encourage LISD at Risk Students and Key Club members to be involved. Gardening education will be an integral part of the program. The agreement would be for three (3) years with automatic renewals of one (1) year unless a thirty (30) day notice is provided by either agreement party. The City shall have the right to terminate the agreement at any time for justifiable cause.

AGREEMENT

CITY OF LOCKHART, TEXAS (CITY) AND TEXAS MASTER GARDENERS ASSOCIATION (TMGA)

The purpose of the agreement is to set forth agreed conditions for use of the garden area located on City of Lockhart property on the West side of North Medina Street just north of the Caldwell County Ministerial Alliance Food Bank located at 901 Bois D Arc Street herein referred to as "the garden area", and more specifically described as that area generally bounded by a chain link fence to the north, west by the Medina Street west curb line, south by the north curb line of the parking lot and to the east by the helicopter pad area. No buildings or fences can be placed within 75' of the outer edge of helicopter pad.

TMGA Agrees:

- 1. To maintain the garden area in an acceptable condition free of tall weeds, grass, and trash
- 2. To use the garden area for the purpose of gardening, teaching gardening, encouraging groups and individuals to be involved in gardening
- 3. To work with Lockhart Independent School District programs such as the Students at Risk and the Key Club to encourage participation in gardening
- 4. That produce from the garden will be mostly used to help supplement supplies at the Food Bank
- 5. Not to use the garden area for any commercial purposes
- 6. To keep all tools and equipment in a safe operable condition and keep such items in secure areas
- 7. To be responsible for the safety of members and participants in any TMGA gardening events and programs
- 8. Not to increase the size of the gardening area without prior written approval from the City
- 9. To ensure that water and/or electric utilities are not excessively used or abused
- 10. To keep City informed about any major improvements such as but not limited to adding water lines, removing structures or adding structures
- 11. That this agreement shall be enforce except as provided herein for three (3) years from the date of approval by the Lockhart City Council, and that the agreement will thereafter automatically renew for one (1) year for each successive year unless a 30 day written notice is provided by either agreement party
- 12. That the City has the right to void this agreement for justifiable cause as determined by the Lockhart City Council. A justifiable cause may include, but not limited to, failure by TMGA to adhere to the provisions in this agreement or the City Council determines that the garden area is needed for a City project
- 13. That all Federal and State Laws regarding discrimination are complied with in regards to operation and use of the garden area
- 14. Official notices from the City are to be sent to:

The City agrees to:

- 1. Provide water for the garden project with the understanding that there must be strict adherence to any water conservation restrictions and that water use is not abused
- 2. That the City will keep areas mowed outside the garden area as described in detail above
- 3. Will assist with mulch as needed and other City services as materials and time are available

Lockhart Community Garden Site

Proposal: Establish a land use agreement between the City of Lockhart, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service/Caldwell County and the Texas Sage Master Gardener Association (501c3) to assume management of the current "Lockhart Community Garden" site. Texas Sage Master Gardeners will serve as garden mentors, volunteers and volunteer activity coordinators with other groups currently using the garden site. Support from the City of Lockhart will remain "as is" with regard to water and mowing services. If at all possible we would like to have access to electrical service.

Such an agreement is beneficial to both parties: initial grant support for the creation of the community garden has ended as has much of the citizen volunteer effort to support it. Master Gardeners are in search of a demonstration/teaching garden site in lieu of plans (which are on indefinite hold) to establish such at the AgriLife Extension Office.

Note: Texas Master Gardeners are trained and certified under the supervision of the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service; we are a non-profit volunteer group that supports AgriLife's educational and outreach goals as specified in the "Texas Master Gardener Management Guide". Funding for projects is dependent on grants, donations and Texas Sage Master Gardeners of Caldwell County fund raising efforts.

SUMMARY OF ITEM

This ordinance amends the amount of allowable total suspended dissolved solids for wastewater discharges for such as, but not limited to, sodium chloride and sodium sulfate. The existing ordinance allows only up to 500 milligrams per liter which is unreasonable and detrimental to business and industrial development. Staff suspects that when the ordinance was originally written the number should have been 5,000 milligrams per liter instead of the 500. For consideration, Lockhart's approved drinking water averages about 500 milligrams per liter of total suspended dissolved solids. Many cities do not place a limit on total suspended dissolved solids, but staff believes the 5,000 would be needed as a cap to avoid large amounts of sodium chloride and sulfates (salts) from being dumped directly into the wastewater system which may not cause problems at the treatment plant but could cause corrosive problems for clay wastewater pipes and concrete manholes. If a business produces excessive amounts, then a pre-filtration process would be required.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

City Manager and Wastewater Superintendent recommend approval of the ordinance as presented.

WHEREAS, the Lockhart City Council recognizes that existing ordinances from time to time must be amended because of new requirements and/or errors; and

WHEREAS, the Lockhart City Council recognizes that the current ordinance in the section stated herein above misrepresented the intent of the ordinance at the time it was passed due to an incorrect stated milligrams number per liter

WHEREAS, upon the recommendation of City staff the Lockhart City Council finds it is necessary to amend the current ordinance as herein above described to appropriately address limits of total dissolved solids such as, but not limited to sodium chloride and sodium sulfate; and

THEREFORE, be ordained by the Lockhart City Council that Chapter 58, Division 2, Section 58-241, Subsection (13) a is hereby amended to read:

I. Sec. 58.241. Items subject to regulation-Designated

(13)

Materials which exert or cause:

(a) Unusual concentration of inert suspended solids greater than 250 milligrams per liter (such as but not limited to fuller's earth, lime slurries, and lime residues) or total dissolved suspended solids greater than 5,000 milligrams per liter (such as, but not limited to sodium chloride and sodium sulfate).

(All other sections remain as adopted)

II. Severability: If any provision, section, clause, sentence, or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, void, invalid, or un-enforced, the validity of the remainder of this ordinance or its application shall not be affected, it being the intent of the City Council in adopting and of the Mayor in approving this ordinance that no portion, provision, or regulation contained herein shall become inoperative or fail by any reasons of any unconstitutionality or invalidity of any other portion, provision, or regulation.

III. Repealer: That all other ordinances, sections, or parts of ordinances heretofore adopted by the City of Lockhart in conflict with the provisions set out above in this ordinance are hereby repealed or amended as indicated.

IV. Publication: That the City Secretary is directed to cause the caption of this ordinance to be published in a newspaper of general circulation according to law.

V. Penalty: Any person who violates any provision of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined as provided in Section 1-8 of the City Code. Nothing in this ordinance will limit the ability of the city to pursue any and all claims and remedies available to it in law or equity in regard to the subject matter of this ordinance.

<u>VI.</u> <u>Publication</u>: The City Secretary is directed to cause the caption of this ordinance to be published in a newspaper of general circulation according to law.

<u>VII.</u> <u>Effective Date:</u> This ordinance shall become effective and be in full force ten days from the date of its passage.

This CO adjusts/adds line items and time due to the City of Lockhart requesting a storm sewer system instead of an open ditch system from FM20 East to the south end of the project.

This CO adds 60 days to complete the work. The total number of 120 days required to perform the added work has been reduced due to the time suspension during negotiations of this CO. Work was ongoing in Phase 3 during these negotiations. The time was suspended beginning November 1, 2016 through January 25, 2017 for a total of 60 days. November time suspension credits 20 days. December time suspension credits 20 days. January time suspension credits 20 days.

This CO also increases Item 0502-2001 BARRICADES, SIGNS AND TRAFFIC HANDLING by six months due to this time extension (120 days/20 days per month = six months).

This CO adds overhead cost for the total number of working days for the added work at a rate of \$1,581.42 per day. A unique item line number 2086 has been added to compensate for additional overhead based on the total 120 days to perform the work.

Over and under run of the existing bid items is not feasible due to the unit cost provided at bid was for all phases of work. The revised cost for the added work should be adjusted based on type of work. Phase 3 is now an urban section with revised methods.

Phase 3 roadway excavation item 1360 will be reduced to zero. A new item 1362 for the new quantity of 5,187 will be added. The unit cost reflects the actual cost used to compensate for the overage in Phase 1 and 2 in CO 6.

Phase 3 embankment item 1365 will be reduced to zero. A new item 1366 for the new quantity of 9,533 will be added. The unit cost reflects the actual cost for place and borrow material for the work in Phase 1 and 2.

DESCRIBE THE REASON FOR THE CHANGE ORDER AND WHAT IS BEING CHANGED. WHEN NECESSARY, INCLUDE EXCEPTIONS TO THIS AGREEMENT:

As a result of CO #1 where the City of Lockhart requested a storm sewer system instead of an open ditch system, this change order adjusts the earthwork quantities and unit cost for the revised work performed in Phase 1 and 2. This is shown on the revised sheet 5C revision 7. Excavation new quantity is 6,122 and embandment new quantity is 1,513.

Over and underrun of the existing bid items at existing bid prices is not feasible due to the unit cost provided at bid was for all phases of work. The revised cost for the added work should be adjusted based on type of work in Phase 1 and 2 being urban work and Phase 3 was rural work. The level of effort for the different type of work areas creates a different unit cost but overrun of a single bid item does not reflect the different unit cost. There is also an increased cost due to a creation of 3,864 CY of waste when at bid time it was borrow with Phase 1 and 2 needing 155 CY.

Phase 1 and 2 excavation original bid line number 0105 with quantity 2,258 will be reduced to zero. Add a new line item 0106 for the 125 percent of the original quantity (2,258 X 1.25 = 2,822 CY) to be compensated at the contractor's original estimated cost to perform the work. This is the estimated cost at bid time once the Phase 3 cost was removed from the average cost provided at bid time. This is reflected in a letter from the Contractor dated 9/15/16.

A new line item 0107 for 3,300 CY (6122 CY - 2822 CY) will be added at actual cost plus profit for the excavation beyond the 125 percent of the original bid quantity. Another new item 0108 for the same quantity CY will be added to compensate for the cost to dispose of the additional waste due to the revised quantities. The contractor provided information of actual cost based on labor, equipment, etc. for this work.

Phase 1 and 2 embankment original bid line number 0110 with quantity of 2,413 will be reduced to zero. A new line item 0111 for a quantity of 1,513 will be added at a unit cost equal to the contractor's original estimated cost to perform the work for Phase 1 and 2.

These prices and quantities are final and will not be adjusted for escalation, etc. The work is complete and these are the final quantities and final cost. Any future revisions to quantities will not be compensable.

It is recognized that this revision will require additional time to be added to the project and milestones. TxDOT and Contractor are in negotiations for the amount of the added time and the associated overhead with this revision. Time and overhead will be added in change order 7.

The below time added to the milestones will also be added to the total contract time.

No person having a financial interest in any commercial carrier by air, or in any concession, right or privilege to conduct any business or render any service for compensation upon the premises of the Lockhart Municipal Airport shall be eligible for membership on the Lockhart Airport Advisory Board. Sec. 4-32. Limitations of authority. The Lockhart Municipal Airport Advisory Board shall not have authority to incur or create any debt in connection with airport operations; nor shall the board be empowered to enter into any contract, leases, or other legal obligations binding upon the City of Lockhart; nor shall the board have authority to hire airport personnel or direct airport personnel in the execution of their duties.
NOTES: CONSTRUCTIO N BOARD APPOINTMENTS	Section B101.4, Board Decision, is amended to read as follows: The construction board of adjustments and appeals shall have the power, as further defined in Appendix B, to hear appeals of decisions and interpretations of the building official and consider variances of the technical codes; and to conduct hearings on determinations of the building official regarding unsafe or dangerous buildings, structures and/or service systems, and to issue orders in accordance with the procedures beginning with section 12-442 of this Code [of Ordinances]. Each member shall serve three-year terms with such terms to coincide with the council position making the appointment. (b) Each board member shall reside within the county and such board shall include one member who shall be a building contractor; one layman; two members shall be master electricians who are currently licensed by the city; and one member shall be either a building contractor or master electrician licensed by the city. There shall be two ex-officion members, one who shall be the city electrical inspector, and one shall be the fire marshal. Sec. 12-133. Officers and quorum. The members of the examining and supervising board of electricians and appeals shall select a chairman and secretary. A quorum shall consist of three members.
NOTES: HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION	 Sec. 28-3. Historical preservation commission. (b) The commission shall consist of seven members, appointed by the city council in accordance with section 2-210, who shall whenever possible meet one or more of the following qualities: (1) A registered architect, planner or representative of a design profession, (2) A registered professional engineer in the State of Texas, (3) A member of a nonprofit historical organization of Caldwell County, (4) A local licensed real estate broker or member of the financial community, (5) An owner of an historic landmark residential building, (6) An owner or tenant of a business property that is an historic landmark or in an historic district, (7) A member of the Caldwell County Historical Commission.
NOTES: PARKS ADVISORY BOARD	Sec. 40-133. Members. (a) The board shall consist of seven members appointed in accordance with section 2-210 to serve three years terms, such terms to coincide with the council position making the appointment and two alternates shall also be appointed by the mayor and mayor pro-tem, one each. 	(2) Council shall seek to appoint the most qualified or best persons available, while also respecting the need for diverse community opinions.
	(3) No member of any appointed body shall serve on more than one quasi-judicial or advisory board or commission.
	(4) No appointed body shall deviate from its charge, deliberate items not on its agendas, or speak for the council or City of Lockhart without council authorization.
	(5) Subject to other qualifications as specifically required for membership on the below boards and commissions, the city council shall have the right (but not the duty) to appoin
	up to two members who are not Lockhart citizens but who are residents of Caldwell County to the Lockhart Airport Advisory Board, the Eugene Clark Library Board, and the
	construction board of appeals.
	(6) Subject to other qualifications as specifically required for membership on the below boards and commissions, the city council shall have the right (but not the duty) to appoint up to two members who are not Lockhart citizens but who are residents of Caldwell County, to the Lockhart Airport Advisory Board, the Eugene Clark Library Board, and the construction board of appeals.
	Section 2-210. Method of selection; number of members; terms.
	(a) The mayor and city councilmembers shall nominate individuals to serve on boards and commissions. Each nomination shall then be confirmed by a simple majority of the entire city council.
NOTES: ORDINANCE RE: ALL BOARD, COMMISSION APPOINTMENTS	(b) Except as provided herein, there shall be seven members appointed to each board or commission corresponding with the seven members or places of the city council. Each city councilmember, except at provided herein, shall nominate a qualified person to serve in a place on an appointed body corresponding to their place on the council. At-large councilmembers shall be designated as places 5 and 6, and the mayor's position as place 7, for the purpose of this section. Nominations shall be made to fill vacant positions and/or positions whose terms have expired within 90 days of the event, such as a resignation or an election. Should any city councilmember fail to name an appointee to one of his/her corresponding places on any body within the above described 90 days, another councilmember shall then have the privilege to nominate a person to fill that same position, as described in subsection (a). However, once that position becomes vacant again for any reason, the appointment shall revert to the place corresponding with the original city council seat/place number for nominations.
	(c) Beginning with the election in May, 1998, the council shall nominate and confirm four members to serve in places 1, 2, 5, 6 on each board and commission in accordance with subsections (a) and (b) above, and with the standards set in Ordinance Number 97-09, Governance Policies. With the election of May, 1999, the remaining three places shall be filled following the same procedure as above.
	(d)Terms of service on appointed bodies shall be the same three-year terms as the councilmember who nominates a person to serve. However, a person may be appointed to complete the unexpired term of a vacant position, due to a resignation, for example.
	(e) When a person has completed a term, or terms, of service and will be vacating a place, that person may continue to serve until a replacement is nominated and confirmed by the city council.
	(f) At the discretion of the majority of the city council, one Caldwell County resident who is also an owner of real property within any local historic district may be appointed as a full member to the historical preservation commission.
	(g) Exceptions to the above regulations shall be all volunteer/special purpose/ad hoc committees appointed from time to time by the city council and the zoning board of adjustments, whose members shall serve two-year terms in accordance with V.T.C.A., Local Government Code § 211.008. All other provisions of this section, and ordinance number 97-09 which do not conflict with the chapters establishing these bodies shall be applicable.
	Sec. 2-212. Removal and resignation of members.
	(a) All board, commission and committee members serve at the pleasure of the city council and may be removed from office with or without cause at the discretion of the city
	council.
	(b) Board, commission and committee members may resign from office at any time by filing a written resignation, dated and signed by the member, with the City Secretary. Such resignation shall take effect upon receipt by the City Secretary without further action by the city council. If the city council appoints a new member to replace the resigned member, the new member shall be appointed to serve out the remainder of the resigned member's term.
