SUMMARY OF ITEM

The subject property, which is located across the highway from the municipal airport and livestock auction barn, was formerly the site of an automobile salvage yard that is now closed. The applicant anticipates a variety of future uses that will require a commercial zoning classification. There is a single-family dwelling on property currently zoned AO adjacent to the north, but the remainder of the land uses in the area are commercial or institutional in nature. Although not immediately abutting the subject property, there is existing CHB zoning nearby, both to the north and to the south. The CHB classification is consistent with the Lockhart 2020 Land Use Plan map, which shows a strip along the east side of the highway designated as future General-Heavy Commercial. The eastern corner of the subject property extends beyond that strip into an area designated as future Medium Density Residential, so that would be a minor deviation from the land use plan. Thus far, there has been no opposition to this proposed zoning change. More complete information is in the attached staff report.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

ORDINANCE 2016-27

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LOCKHART, TEXAS, AMENDING THE OFFICIAL ZONING MAP OF THE CITY OF LOCKHART, TEXAS, TO RECLASSIFY THE PROPERTY KNOWN AS 11.133 ACRES IN THE ESTHER BERRY SURVEY, ABSTRACT NUMBER 1, LOCATED AT 2112 SOUTH COLORADO STREET (US 183), FROM AO AGRICULTURAL– OPEN SPACE DISTRICT TO CHB COMMERCIAL HEAVY BUSINESS DISTRICT.

WHEREAS, on September 28, 2016, the Planning and Zoning Commission held a public hearing and voted unanimously to recommend approval of said change; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to amend the zoning map accordingly as provided in Section 64-128 of the Code of Ordinances; and,

WHEREAS, a public hearing was held in conformance with applicable law;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOCKHART, TEXAS, THAT:

I. The above-referenced property described in Zoning Change request ZC-16-06 as 11.133 acres in the Esther Berry Survey, Abstract Number 1, more particularly described in Exhibit A and located at 2112 South Colorado Street (US 183), will be reclassified from AO Agricultural-Open Space District to CHB Commercial Heavy Business District.

II. Severability: If any provision, section, clause, sentence, or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, void, invalid, or unenforced, the validity of the remainder of this ordinance or its application shall not be affected, it being the intent of the City Council in adopting and of the Mayor in approving this ordinance that no portion, provision, or regulation contained herein shall become inoperative or fail by way of reasons of any unconstitutionality or invalidity of any other portion, provision or regulation.

III. Repealer: That all other ordinances, sections, or parts of ordinances heretofore adopted by the City of Lockhart in conflict with the provisions set out above in this ordinance are hereby repealed or amended as indicated.

IV. Publication: That the City Secretary is directed to cause this ordinance caption to be published in a newspaper of general circulation according to law.

V. Effective Date: That this ordinance shall become effective and be in full force immediately upon and from the date of its passage.





BACKGROUND DATA

APPLICANT(S): Janey Mae Evans OWNER(S): Same as Applicant SITE LOCATION: 2112 S. ANALYSIS OF ISSUES

REASON FOR REQUESTED CHANGE: The property is currently zoned AO Agricultural-Open Space, and the applicant indicates proposed uses such as retail, office, a preschool, etc., which require a commercial zoning classification.

AREA CHARACTERISTICS:

TRANSITION OF ZONING DISTRICTS: The subject property is bordered by adjacent properties that are also zoned AO Agriculture-Open Space. The properties to the north and south are currently bordered by adjacent properties that are zoned CHB Commercial Heavy Business. Zoning the subject property CHB Commercial Heavy Business creates the opportunity for continuity of the CHB Commercial Heavy Business zoning district in this area. This is also consistent with future land use designation shown on the Lockhart 2020 Land Use Plan map.

ADEQUACY OF INFRASTRUCTURE: The property can be served by utilities, and has vehicular access from South Colorado Street. A 12-inch water main extends along Colorado Street adjacent to the subject property, but the property currently uses a septic tank for wastewater. The City will construct an extension from an 18-inch main on the west side of Colorado Street to provide wastewater service to the property. 1

POTENTIAL NEIGHBORHOOD IMPACT: The prior use of this property was an auto salvage yard. This type of use is industrial in nature and requires a Specific Use Permit in the IH Industrial Heavy zoning district. An auto salvage yard would not be a permitted use in the CHB Commercial Heavy Business District. Staff believes that reducing the intensity of uses allowed on the subject property should have a positive impact on the neighborhood, and the uses allowed by the proposed zoning district will be consistent with what exists in the area since there are nearby properties with the same CHB Commercial Heavy Business zoning classification.

CONSISTENCY WITH COMPREHENSIVE PLAN: The requested CHB zoning district is consistent with the Lockhart 2020 Land Use Plan map designation of General-Heavy Commercial. Even though a portion of the parcel is shown in the Future Land Use Plan as Medium Density Residential, the majority of it is designated General-Heavy Commercial. Staff doesn't believe that rezoning the entire property to CHB will conflict with the intent of the Land Use Plan to provide for more intense uses in this area along South Colorado Street.

ALTERNATIVE CLASSIFICATIONS: Other commercial zoning district classifications could be considered for the subject site. However, based upon the surrounding uses, the CHB zoning to the north and south of the subject property beyond the AO zoning, and the Future Land Use Plan map, staff believes that CHB is a reasonable zoning classification for this property.

RESPONSE TO NOTIFICATION: Public hearing notices were mailed to five surrounding property owners. Staff has received no responses or inquiries as of the date of this report, and no one spoke in opposition at the Planning and Zoning Commission meeting.

Mayor White opened the work session and advised the Council, staff and the audience that staff would provide information and explanations about the following items:

DISCUSSION ONLY

A. DISCUSS MINUTES OF THE CITY COUNCIL MEETING OF SEPTEMBER 6, 2016. Mayor White requested corrections to the minutes. There were none.

B. DISCUSS RESOLUTION 2016-16 SUPPORTING THE LOCKHART TC I, LP DEVELOPMENT, EMLI AT LOCKHART, APPLICATION TO THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND COMMUNITY AFFAIRS TO CONSTRUCT 288 UNITS OF AFFORDABLE RENTAL HOUSING TO BE LOCATED AT 2111 WEST SAN ANTONIO STREET.

Mr. Rodgers stated that the Resolution of no objection or of support is required to accompany the developer's application to the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs seeking to construct 288 units of affordable rental housing to be located at 2111 West San Antonio Street. Typical building renderings and the site layout plan were submitted to the Council for review. A public hearing was held at the Caldwell County Courthouse, 2nd Floor, at 5:30 p.m. on Tuesday, September 13, 2016, to hear public comments about the proposed project. Mr. Rodgers recommended approval. There was discussion.

C. DISCUSS DOWNTOWN AREA STREET CLOSURES FOR THE 2017 HOT RODS AND HATTERS EVENT WITH PARTIAL CLOSURES BEGINNING ON THURSDAY THROUGH SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 6 THROUGH FEBRUARY 8, 2017.

Mr. Rodgers provided details about the streets that Joel Gammage of Hot Rods and Hatters is requesting to close for their event that will be held on February 6-8, 2017. Mr. Gammage has signed approvals by the businesses and residents on all of these street closures except for a couple that he is working on obtaining. Samples of support letters are also provided. Mr. Gammage expects 800 or more vehicles at the 2017 event. North Main from Walnut to Pecan will remain open. He has also obtained permission from large parking lot owners to help alleviate some of display and parking issues experienced during the

2016 event. A drive-in type movie is planned for Friday night, February 3. The City will provide traffic control, security, barricades, signage, trash carts, trash dumpsters, and help with advertising and amenities costs. Mr. Gammage has agreed and will provide sufficient general liability insurance naming the City of Lockhart as an additional insured certificate holder. Mr. Rodgers recommended approval. There was discussion.

Joel Gammage, 916 South Main St., addressed the Council and provided details about the streets that he requests to be closed to accommodate the Hot Rods and Hatters event.

D. DISCUSS ENGINEERING SERVICES AGREEMENT WITH TRC ENGINEERING FOR THE WATER AND WASTEWATER IMPACT FEE UPDATE ACCORDING TO THE NEGOTIATED SCOPE OF WORK FOR A LUMP SUM AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$27,500, AND APPOINTING THE CITY MANAGER TO SIGN THE AGREEMENT IF APPROVED. [FORM 1295: 2016-09-20-18]

Mr. Rodgers stated that the Water and Wastewater Impact fee update is required. The scope of work requirements to be performed by TRC Engineering is listed in the agreement. TRC has performed this task before. Mr. Rodgers recommended approval.

E. DISCUSS AGREEMENT WITH TECHLINE CONSTRUCTION, LLC, OF AUSTIN, TEXAS, TO PROVIDE ALL SUPERVISION, LABOR, AND EQUIPMENT TO EXTEND ELECTRIC THREE PHASE PRIMARY LINES FROM THE SOUTHEAST CORNER OF MAPLE AT SH 130 TO THE SOUTHWEST CORNER OF MAPLE AT CITY LINE ROAD AND FROM THAT CORNER SOUTH TO CLEARFORK STREET FOR A FEE NOT TO EXCEED \$67,670, AND AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO SIGN THE AGREEMENT IF APPROVED. [FORM 1295: 2016-09-20-19]

Mr. Rodgers stated that the City of Lockhart has a construction and materials contract agreement valid through 2018 with the Lower Colorado River Authority (LCRA). Under that agreement, LCRA has taken public bids for electric construction related to labor/equipment and materials. This work will include extending the new primary line from the southeast corner of Maple at SH 130 to the southwest corner of Maple at City Line Road and then south a Clearfork Street distribution line for a fee not to exceed \$67,670. Mr. Rodgers recommended approval. There was brief discussion.

F. DISCUSS ORDINANCE 2016-23 AMENDING CHAPTER 46 "SIGNS" OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES TO CORRECT ERRORS IN PREVIOUS ORDINANCE 2015-20; AMENDING SECTION 46-6 "PROHIBITED SIGNS AND LOCATIONS", SUBSECTION (A)(7), AND AMENDING SECTION 46-7 "SIGNS EXEMPT FROM SECTION 46-11(B)", SUBSECTIONS (10) AND (24).

Mr. Gibson stated that on September 1, 2015, following the recommendations of an ad hoc committee consisting of representatives of businesses in Lockhart, the Council adopted Ordinance 2015-20, which amended the sign ordinance primarily with respect to various types of temporary signs. It was recently discovered that not all of the proposed changes made it into the ordinance as intended, and unintended changes were inadvertently included. This is due primarily to a staff error in incorrectly translating from the annotated version of the text amendment to the "clean" version that was the basis for the wording in Ordinance 2015-20. Also, one error was the result of MuniCode's codification of the ordinance where a phrase was left out that was shown correctly in Ordinance 2015-20. Therefore, the purpose of this amendment is simply "housekeeping" to restore the intended wording to the sign ordinance. It does not create any new or different provisions that have not already been discussed. Mr. Gibson explained the text amendments in detail. He recommended approval.

G. DISCUSS NEW RECREATION SUPPORT TYPE BUILDING IN CITY PARK AND CONSIDERING POSSIBLE LOCATIONS WITHIN THE PARK.

Mr. Rodgers stated that Steinborner and Associates, Architects, looked at three possible locations with City Park for a recreation support type building. Location #1 is just south of the pool and could be moved closer to the Main Pavilion and attached if the location is chosen. Location #2 is north of the North Pavilion. Location #3 would be rehabilitation of the amphitheater. Pros and cons as seen by the architect are listed on each location map. Excerpts from the Parks Advisory Board's minutes were provided regarding the structure. There was discussion.

Mayor White suggested pulling the item and wait to discuss the building after the updated Parks Master Plan is completed.

Councilmember Castillo thanked Mr. Steinborner for the architectural work and for providing options about the new structure.

H. DISCUSS PRIORITIZATION OF PARKS IMPROVEMENTS BY MAYOR AND COUNCILMEMBERS AND REGARDING FUNDING OF AN UPDATED PARKS MASTER PLAN ESTIMATED AT \$50,000.

Mr. Rodgers stated that at the last Council meeting, it was decided by the Council to prioritize the parks improvement list so it could be compared with the Parks Advisory Board priority list. Responses were received by the Mayor and two Councilmembers which were included in the packet long with the Parks Advisory Board's priority list. The City Manager has determined that the Parks Master Plan estimated at \$50,000 can be funded by the 2015 Certificates of Obligation Parks Funds as long as the parks projects identified in the master plan are funded from the same funds. \$750,000 is left in that fund account. There was discussion. Staff will continue to work on an updated Parks Master Plan.

I. DISCUSS RE-AFFIRMING APPOINTMENTS TO THE CAPITAL AREA COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS (CAPCOG) GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

Mayor White stated that he and Councilman John Castillo serve on the CAPCOG General Assembly. He recommended that each appointment is reaffirmed. There was discussion.

ITEM 1. CALL TO ORDER.

Mayor Lew White called the regular meeting of the Lockhart City Council to order on this date at 7:30 p.m.

ITEM 2. INVOCATION, PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE.

Invocation – Councilmember Benny Hilburn Pledge of Allegiance to the United States and Texas flags.

ITEM 3. CITIZENS/VISITORS COMMENTS.

Mayor White requested citizens to address the Council. There were none. <u>ITEM 4-A. HOLD A PUBLIC HEARING ON APPLICATION ZC-16-05 BY LYDIA SERNA ON</u> <u>BEHALF OF JAMES QUEZADA FOR A ZONING CHANGE FROM CMB COMMERCIAL</u> <u>MEDIUM BUSINESS DISTRICT TO CCB COMMERCIAL CENTRAL BUSINESS DISTRICT</u>

FOR PART OF LOTS 1 AND 6, BLOCK 28, ORIGINAL TOWN OF LOCKHART, CONSISTING OF 0.185 ACRE LOCATED AT 109 WEST WALNUT STREET.

Mayor White opened the public hearing at 7:35 p.m. and requested the staff report.

Mr. Gibson stated that the applicant requested the same zoning change a little over one year ago, and it was not approved by the Council due to a tie vote with one abstention. The current and proposed use of the property is a restaurant. The block where the subject property is located is zoned entirely CMB, while the central business districts blocks to the south are zoned CCB. The requested zoning change would simply expand the boundary of the CCB district. There is not a significant difference between those classifications, although the CCB district is generally more restrictive except that it allows bars upon approval of a specific use permit, whereas the CMB district does not allow bars at all. Mr. Gibson also explained that the building on the subject property along with others on that block, are nonconforming in the current CMB zoning due to having no front or side setbacks, whereas they would be conforming in the requested CCB zoning classification. The required CCB zoning is consistent with the mixed use designation of the property on the Lockhart 2020 Future Land Use Plan map, which includes the entire central business district and surrounding area. Three letters of protest and 274 letters of support have been received. Even though only three letters of protest were received, they represent the ownership of far more than 20 percent of land area within 200 feet of the subject property. Therefore, in accordance with the zoning ordinance and State law, the City Council can approve the zoning change only by an affirmative vote by 3/4 of the total council membership, which when rounded up, is at least six votes out of seven. Mr. Gibson stated that the Planning and Zoning Commission failed to make a recommendation due to a 2-2-1 vote on a motion to recommended approval. Staff recommends approval.

Mayor White requested Lydia Serna, applicant of the zoning change, to address the Council.

Lydia Serna. 251 Wild Buffalo, spoke in favor of and requested approval of the zoning change.

Mayor White requested additional citizens to address the Council. There were none. He closed the public hearing at 8:40 p.m.

DISCUSSION AND/OR ACTION TO CONSIDER ORDINANCE 2016-22 AMENDING THE OFFICIAL ZONING MAP OF THE CITY OF LOCKHART, TEXAS, TO RECLASSIFY THE PROPERTY KNOWN AS PART OF LOTS 1 AND 6, BLOCK 28, ORIGINAL TOWN OF LOCKHART, CONSISTING OF 0.185 ACRE LOCATED AT 109 WEST WALNUT STREET, FROM CMB COMMERCIAL MEDIUM BUSINESS DISTRICT TO CCB COMMERCIAL CENTRAL BUSINESS DISTRICT.

Councilmember Hilburn spoke against the zoning change.

Mayor Pro-Tem Sanchez spoke against the zoning change.

Councilmember Castillo spoke in favor of the zoning change.

Councilmember Westmoreland spoke in favor of the zoning change.

Councilmember Mendoza spoke in favor of the zoning change.

Councilmember Michelson spoke in favor of the zoning change.

Mayor White spoke against the zoning change.

<u>Councilmember Castillo made a motion to approve the Ordinance 2016-22 amending the Official Zoning</u> <u>Map of the City of Lockhart, Texas, to reclassify the property known as part of Lots 1 and 6, Block 28,</u> <u>Original Town of Lockhart, consisting of 0.185 acre located at 109 West Walnut Street from CMB</u> <u>Commercial Medium Business District to CCB Commercial Central Business District. Councilmember</u> <u>Mendoza seconded.</u> The motion failed by a vote of 4-3, with Mayor White, Mayor Pro-Tem Sanchez and Councilmember Hilburn opposing. The motion failed due to the lack of an affirmative vote by 3/4 of the total council membership (six out of seven votes).

ITEM 4-C. HOLD THE SECOND OF TWO PUBLIC HEARINGS ON A PROPOSAL TO INCREASE TOTAL TAX REVENUES FROM PROPERTIES ON THE TAX ROLL IN THE PRECEDING YEAR BY 1.593239 PERCENT. ANNOUNCE THAT THE VOTE ON THE BUDGET AND TAX RATE WILL BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 27, 2016 AT 6:30 P.M. AT THE CLARK LIBRARY ANNEX, COUNCIL CHAMBERS, 217 SOUTH MAIN STREET, 3RD FLOOR, LOCKHART, TEXAS, 78644.

Mayor White opened the public hearing at 9:04 p.m. and requested the staff report.

Mr. Hinson provided information and there was discussion regarding the proposed tax rate as follows:

• Proposal to increase total tax revenues from properties on the tax roll in the preceding tax year by 1.593239 percent.

- The average taxable value of a residence homestead in City of Lockhart last year was \$111,581. Based on last year's tax rate of \$0.733300 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed last year on the average home was \$818.22.
- The average taxable value of a residence homestead in City of Lockhart this year is \$116,851. If the governing body adopts the effective tax rate for this year of \$0.721800 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed this year on the average home would be \$843.43.
- If the governing body adopts the proposed tax rate of \$0.733300 per \$100 of taxable value, the amount of taxes imposed this year on the average home would be \$856.87.

Mayor White requested comments from citizens that were in favor of or against the proposed property tax increase. There were none. He closed the public hearing at 9:03 p.m.

Mayor White announced that the vote on the proposed budget and tax rate will be held on September 27, 2016 at 6:30 p.m. at the Clark Library Annex, Council Chambers, 217 South Main Street, 3rd Floor, Lockhart, Texas.

Terry Black, 429 Connolly Circle, spoke in favor of the event and street closures in the interest of public safety.

Dustin Little, 983 Acorn, Lockhart, spoke in favor of the event and expressed support of the street closures in the interest of public safety.

Melissa Okeefe, 2516 Mineral Springs Road, spoke in favor of the street closures stating that she believed that closing all the streets of the event would encourage public safety and could increase foot traffic to the downtown businesses.

Joel Gammage requested approval of the street closures as presented.

Councilmember Michelson stated that Chuck Nash and Nappa have agreed to work with Joel Gammage to dedicate a space on their business property located near the event in addition to agreeing to closing streets surrounding the business.

There was discussion.

Councilmember Hilburn made a motion to approve street closures as presented by Joel Gammage of Hot Rods and Hatters and authorizing the City Manager to make any adjustments as deemed necessary to finalize the street closures. Mayor Pro-Tem Sanchez seconded. The motion passed by a vote of 7-0.

He stated that he presented a proclamation at the Parkview Nursing home to Ms. Schneider in honor of her 100th birthday on September 14, 2016.

Mayor White thanked Council for helping him with ensuring the Council's presence at ceremonial events when he is unable to attend. He congratulated the Hispanic Chamber for a successful Diez y Seis event. He stated that he appreciated everyone's patience during the Highway 183 road expansion project.

ITEM 1. CALL TO ORDER.

Mayor Lew White called the special meeting of the Lockhart City Council to order on this date at 6:30 p.m.

ITEM 2. CITIZENS/VISITORS COMMENTS.

Mayor White requested citizens to address the Council. There were none.

ITEM 3-A. DISCUSSION AND/OR ACTION TO CONSIDER ORDINANCE 2016-24 RATIFYING A PROPERTY TAX INCREASE OF 1.593239 PERCENT FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2016-2017 FOR THE USE AND SUPPORT OF THE MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT FOR THE CITY OF LOCKHART.

Mr. Hinson stated that the ratification ordinance is required by State law. He provided details as follows:

- This budget will raise more total property taxes than last year's budget by \$188,922 or 5.343191% and of that amount \$88,545 is tax revenue to be raised from new property added to the tax roll this year based on an ad valorem rate of 73.33 cents per each 100 dollars property valuation.
- The 2016 taxable value on the 2016 certified appraisal roll totals \$540,153,785 compared to \$517,173,072 in 2015. An additional \$3,564,970 of taxable value is still under protest.

Councilmember Hilburn made a motion to approve Ordinance 2016-24 ratifying a property tax increase of 1.593239 percent for the Fiscal Year 2016-2017 for the use and support of the Municipal Government for the City of Lockhart. Councilmember Michelson seconded. The motion passed by a vote of 7-0.

ITEM 3-B. DISCUSSION AND/OR ACTION TO CONSIDER ORDINANCE 2016-25 ADOPTING THE BUDGET AND APPROPRIATING RESOURCES FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2016-2017, BEGINNING OCTOBER 1, 2016 FOR THE CITY OF LOCKHART, CALDWELL COUNTY, TEXAS.

Mr. Hinson stated that the Ordinance adopts the budget as discussed and as determined by the Council.

The budget includes the following funds:

General, Debt Service, Electric, Water, Wastewater, Solid Waste, Emergency Medical Service, Airport, Trust and Agency, Miscellaneous Utility, Capital Funds, Special Revenue, and Lockhart Economic Development Corporation.

The total revenue and sources of funds is \$56,227,243. The total expenditures are \$56,227,243.

Mayor Pro-Tem Sanchez made a motion to approve Ordinance 2016-25 adopting the budget and appropriating resources for the Fiscal Year 2016-2017, beginning October 1, 2016 for the City of Lockhart, Caldwell County, Texas. Councilmember Westmoreland seconded. The motion passed by a vote of 7-0.

ITEM 3-C. DISCUSSION AND/OR ACTION TO CONSIDER ORDINANCE 2016-26 LEVYING MAINTENANCE AND OPERATIONS PROPERTY TAXES FOR THE USE AND SUPPORT OF THE CITY OF LOCKHART, TEXAS AND INTEREST AND SINKING PROPERTY TAXES FOR THE DEBT SERVICE OBLIGATIONS OF THE CITY OF LOCKHART FOR FISCAL YEAR 2017, BEGINNING OCTOBER 1, 2016 AND ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 2017.

Mr. Hinson provided the following information about the Fiscal Year 2016-2017 property tax rate:

- For the maintenance and operations needs of the City of Lockhart, the maintenance and operations (M&O) property tax is hereby adopted as 60.33 cents per each 100 dollars of property valuation. The tax rate will raise more taxes for maintenance and operations than last year's tax rate. The tax rate will effectively be raised by 2.7243 percent and will raise taxes for maintenance and operations on a \$100,000 home by approximately \$16.00; and,
- For the debt service obligations of the City of Lockhart, interest and sinking (I&S) property tax is hereby adopted as 13.00 cents per each 100 dollars property valuation.
- The total property tax rate is 73.33 cents per each 100 dollars of property valuation. This tax rate resulted in a tax increase of 1.593239 percent for Fiscal Year 2016-2017.

Councilmember Michelson made a motion that the property tax rate be increased by the adoption of a tax rate of 73.33 cents per 100 dollars taxable value, or an increase of 1.593239 in total tax revenue from properties on the tax roll in the preceding year. Councilmember Hilburn seconded.

The record vote is as follows: Councilmember Brad Westmoreland – in favor Councilmember Juan Mendoza – in favor Mayor Pro-Tem Angie Gonzales-Sanchez – in favor Councilmember Benny Hilburn – in favor Councilmember John Castillo – in favor Councilmember Jeffry Michelson – in favor Mayor Lew White – in favor VOTE: The motion passed by a vote of 7-0.

Mr. Rodgers thanked the Council for their support.

In accordance with State law, the impact Fee Advisory Committee has an ongoing role in monitoring and evaluating implementation of the impact fee capital improvement plans, and submitting semi-annual reports to City Council. The committee met on September 28 to consider their 29 th semi-annual report since impact fees were originally adopted on January 15, 2002. The current total balance of all impact fee accounts is \$1,333,370. Total impact fee revenue during this six-month period was \$207,013 and no funds were spent on impact fee CIP projects during that time. The attached report from the Committee summarizes their previous recommendation that an update of the land use assumptions, capital improvement plans, and impact fees be prepared in time for adoption in early 2017. On April 19, 2016, the Council directed staff to retain the services of consultants for that purpose, and in September subsequently approved professional services agreements with Freese and Nichols, Inc., and with TRC Engineering. The Committee again requests that the Council expedite the appointment of an ETJ representative to the Impact Fee Advisory Committee. By State law, water and wastewater impact fees cannot be assessed where our service area extends into the ETJ without that representation.

IMPACT FEE REPORT To Lockhart City Council –September 2016

PURPOSE

State law requires a continuing semi-annual role for the Impact Fee Advisory Committee in monitoring the progress of implementation of the impact fee ordinance, and in advising the City Council on needed revisions. More specifically, State law provides that the Committee:

- 1) Monitor and evaluate implementation of the capital improvements plans;
- 2) File semi-annual reports with respect to the progress of the capital improvements plans and report to City Council any perceived inequities in implementing the plans or imposing the impact fees; and,
- 3) Advise the City Council of the need to update or revise the land use assumptions, capital improvements plans, and impact fees.

The Committee's previous report to the Council was submitted and accepted last April. This is the 29th status report since the impact fee ordinance was originally adopted on January 15, 2002, and the 19th one since the last impact fee update was adopted on March 20, 2007.

STATUS OF ACCOUNTS

As shown in **Exhibit A**, a total of \$207,013 was collected during the past six months, and no funds were spent on impact fee CIP projects during that time. The water, wastewater, and road impact fee account balances for the previous semi-annual report, as well as the current balances as of September 15, 2016, are shown in the table. These totals include accrued interest.

Revenue during the past six months was from 48 new houses, three new duplexes, four multi-family units, and one restaurant.

The total estimated cost of all of the CIP projects is \$32,455,825. However, the City Council adopted one-half that amount as the maximum to be collected by March 20, 2017, which is the end of the current ten-year CIP period, so the maximum fees are based on an estimated cost of all three CIP's being \$ 16,236,913. The total of all impact fees spent on CIP projects so far is \$1,120,110, so that leaves \$15,116,803 to still be spent. The total balance available remaining collectively in the three impact fee accounts which can be used toward meeting that goal, is \$1,333,370.

PROGRESS AND TRENDS

The pie charts in **Exhibit B** graphically summarize the progress in collecting the fees needed to pay for one-half of the estimated cost of all projects in each of the impact fee categories. **Exhibit C** compares the current total fees collected with the amount spent on projects and the amount of the remaining estimated costs of projects in each of the three CIP's that has not yet been spent. The bar graph in **Exhibit D** illustrates the impact fee collection trends since July 2003. The amount of impact fee revenue collected since the September 2012 report trended upward each six-month period until the September 2015 report, which decreased due primarily to a reduced supply of available vacant lots for new home construction. The revenue in the two reporting periods since then has trended upward again.

Periods of accelerated growth help offset slow years. It is important to build a healthy balance in all of the accounts because there is a significant potential for development along SH 130 where the City does not currently have adequate infrastructure, but where many of the needed projects are already listed in the impact fee CIP's. For example, the proposed water and wastewater system improvements and an upgrade of City Line Road in the west part of the city are necessary for accommodating growth in that area. There are currently several major projects being planned for various locations throughout the city, and which could potentially provide a significant boost to impact fee revenues.

RECOMMENDATION

The Impact Fee Advisory Committee's previous report submitted to the Council on April 19, 2016, recommended that an update of the land use assumptions, capital improvement plans, and impact fees be conducted. It was noted that State law provides for updates every five years, but no update was done in 2012 when it would normally have been due because the City Council determined that it was not needed. Growth had been slow and construction costs were stable during the recession. The cost of constructing infrastructure has now increased considerably, and an adjustment of some project locations and scope is needed. Therefore, upon receiving the Committee's previous report, the Council directed staff to hire consultants as needed to assist with the impact fee update. Subsequently, on September 6 the Council approved a professional services agreement with Freese and Nichols, Inc., for updating the land use assumptions and road impact fee capital improvements plan. On September 20, the Council approved a contract with TRC Engineering for updating the water and wastewater impact fee capital improvements plans. The Impact Fee Advisory Committee will work with the consultants to recommend the updated land use assumptions, capital improvements plans, and impact fees to the City Council for adoption in early 2017.

The Committee again recommends that the City Council expedite the appointment of an ETJ representative to the Impact Fee Advisory Committee. By State law, water and wastewater impact fees cannot be assessed where our service area extends into the ETJ without that representation.

Police Chief Michael Lummus will retire	e from the City	of Lockhart e	effective Oct	ober 31, 2016. He

Police Chief Michael Lummus will retire from the City of Lockhart effective October 31, 2016. He has selflessly served as the Lockhart Police Chief for 10 ½ years. His leadership and work ethic is to be commended. The selection process for appointing a replacement Police Chief is well under way. However, to fill the gap between Chief Lummus' retirement and the selection of a Police Chief, Captain John Roescher has been selected by the City Manager to serve as an Interim Police Chief. Captain Roescher has served in the Lockhart Police Department since 1985, starting as a Patrol Officer moving up through the ranks to his current position of Captain in 2006. To satisfy Civil Service law, the City Council is being asked to consider confirming this interim appointment, allowing Captain Roescher the authorities of a Police Chief, until such time that a Police Chief is appointed and confirmed.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

City Manager respectfully requests that the City Council confirm his appointment of Mr. John Roescher to the position of Interim Police Chief effective October 31, 2016 until such time as a Police Chief is appointed by the City Manager and confirmed by the City Council.

Sec. 143.013. APPOINTMENT AND REMOVAL OF DEPARTMENT HEAD. (a) Unless elected, each department head is:

(1) appointed by the municipality's chief executive and confirmed by the municipality's governing body; or

(2) in a municipality having an elected fire or police commissioner, appointed by the fire or police commissioner in whose department the vacancy exists and confirmed by the municipality's governing body.

(b) A person appointed as head of a fire department must be eligible for certification by the Texas Commission on Fire Protection at the intermediate level or its equivalent as determined by that commission and must have served as a fully paid fire fighter for at least five years. A person appointed as head of a police department must be eligible for certification by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement at the intermediate level or its equivalent as determined by that commission and must have served as a bona fide law enforcement officer for at least five years.

(c) Except as provided by Subsection (d), if a person is removed from the position of department head, the person shall be reinstated in the department and placed in a position with a rank not lower than that held by the person immediately before appointment as department head. The person retains all rights of seniority in the department.

(d) If a person serving as department head is charged with an offense in violation of civil service rules and is dismissed from the civil service or discharged from his position as department head, the person has the same rights and privileges of a hearing before the commission and in the same manner and under the same conditions as a classified employee. If the commission finds that the charges are untrue or unfounded, the person shall immediately be restored to the same classification that the person held before appointment as department head. The person has all the rights and privileges of the prior position according to seniority and shall be paid his full salary for the time of suspension.

Nominations shall be made to fill vacant positions and/or positions whose terms have expired within 90 days of the event, such as a resignation or an election. Should any city councilmember fail to name an appointee to one of his/her corresponding places on any body within the above described 90 days, another councilmember shall then have the privilege to nominate a person to fill that same position, as described in subsection (a). However, once that position becomes vacant again for any reason, the appointment shall revert to the place corresponding with the original city council seat/place number for nominations.
	(c) Beginning with the election in May, 1998, the council shall nominate and confirm four members to serve in places 1, 2, 5, 6 on each board and commission in accordance with subsections (a) and (b) above, and with the standards set in Ordinance Number 97-09, Governance Policies. With the election of May, 1999, the remaining three places shall be filled following the same procedure as above.
	(d)Terms of service on appointed bodies shall be the same three-year terms as the councilmember who nominates a person to serve. However, a person may be appointed to complete the unexpired term of a vacant position, due to a resignation, for example.
	(e) When a person has completed a term, or terms, of service and will be vacating a place, that person may continue to serve until a replacement is nominated and confirmed by the city council.
. :	(f) At the discretion of the majority of the city council, one Caldwell County resident who is also an owner of real property within any local historic district may be appointed as a full member to the historical preservation commission.
	(g) Exceptions to the above regulations shall be all volunteer/special purpose/ad hoc committees appointed from time to time by the city council and the zoning board of adjustments, whose members shall serve two-year terms in accordance with V.T.C.A., Local Government Code § 211.008. All other provisions of this section, and ordinance number 97-09 which do not conflict with the chapters establishing these bodies shall be applicable.
	Sec. 2-212. Removal and resignation of members.
	(a) All board, commission and committee members serve at the pleasure of the city council and may be removed from office with or without cause at the discretion of the city
	council
	(b) Board, commission and committee members may resign from office at any time by filing a written resignation, dated and signed by the member, with the City Secretary. Such resignation shall take effect upon receipt by the City Secretary without further action by the city council. If the city council appoints a new member to replace the resigned member, the new member shall be appointed to serve out the remainder of the resigned member's term.
