Reverse parade planned for Dickens Christmas

While the Dickens Christmas tradition will continue, the celebration will have a different look this year as the country continues to fight the COVID-19 pandemic.

Dickens 2020 will take the form of a reverse parade, which features floats that stay in place, allowing patrons in cars to view them as they drive slowly by.

Those who plan on driving through and viewing the floats are asked to remain safely in their vehicles. The reverse parade will be held from 7-8:30 p.m. on Saturday, December 5.

Should a spike in COVID-19 cases occur, public health emergency be issued, a natural disaster occurs, or other factors that could impact the event's safe production, the



city will respond accordingly with additional safety precautions or canceling the event.

The reverse parade route will be entered from East San Antonio Street onto South Commerce Street.

Follow the route to the reverse parade's end at the corner of Main and Prairie Lea Streets.

Other features of the traditional Dickens celebration will take on a virtual format, available for viewing on the Dr. Eugene Clark

Library's YouTube channel on or after December 5 through December 31.

The virtual celebration will include the lighting of the Christmas Tree by this year's Most Worthy Citizen and performances by the Lockhart High School band, Falconer, Ballet Folklorico and more.

And, of course, you need to get into the holiday spirit, stop by the Dr. Eugene Clark Library, where the halls have been thoroughly decked.

5 ways to pay your utility bill

The City of Lockhart offers the following easy methods to pay your bill in a snap:

Follow these tips to save money, energy this winter

Pipes that are not insulated can cause you to use more hot water.

Insulating pipes can help keep water warm as it travels from the water heater. It can also help decrease the chance of pipes freezing, which can be disastrous. Check to see if your pipes are warm to the touch.

If so, consider adding insulation. You can get pre-slit pipe foam at most hardware stores. Cut it to size and fasten in place with duct tape.

Insulate Your Water Heater Tank: Insulating your water heater tank is fairly simple and inexpensive. Choose one with an insulating value of at least R-8. You can probably install an insulating pre-cut jacket or blanket on your electric water heater tank yourself.

Read and follow the directions carefully. Leave the thermostat access panel uncovered. Don't set the thermostat above 130°F on electric water heaters with an insulating jacket or blanket—the wiring may overheat. The installation of insulating blankets or jackets on gas and oil-filter water heater tanks is more difficult than those for electric water heater tanks.

It's best to have a qualified plumbing and heating contractor add the insulation.

Weatherize Windows: Windows provide a view to the outside, day lighting, ventilation, and solar heating in the winter. Unfortunately, they can also account for 10% to 25% of your heating bill. You can use a heavy-duty, clear plastic sheet on a frame or tape clear plastic to the inside of windows during the winter months.

The plastic must be sealed tightly to the frame to help reduce infiltration.

Add caulking around windowseals.

Open curtains on your south-facing windows during the day to allow sunlight to naturally heat your home, and close them at night to reduce the chill you may feel from cold windows.

Window A/C Units can allow cool air to sneak through the cracks. During winter, you most likely won't be using your window A/C unit, so consider removing it from your window or purchase a quality tarp to cover the outside of the unit to reduce drafts.

Bathroom Water Usage: Use only as much water as you really need. A water-efficient showerhead often uses less water than a bath.

Bundle Up Your Home: Hidden gaps and cracks in a home can add up to as much airflow as an open window. The more heat that escapes, the more cold air enters, causing your system to work harder and use more energy. Home Sealing can improve your home's efficiency. Start by sealing air leaks and adding insulation. The biggest gaps are often in the attic.

EDC updates plan, welcomes new business to Lockhart

The new facility will house the company's natural light greenhouses, processing operations and artificial-intelligence-enabled robots to bring fresh, clean and healthy food to customers and communities throughout Texas.
